



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

It's hard to believe this is our last term and our last Bulletin for 2011.

It's been a busy year as usual with many successes and achievements. Currently the Executive are integrating our HSC, SC, ESSA and NAPLAN data from 2009 – 2010 to look for trends, issues and action areas which will form the basis of our next three year Strategic Plan. The 2012-2014 School Plan will highlight our targets, based on our data, to ensure Warners Bay High School continues to improve academic, sporting and cultural outcomes for our students.

The analysis of data has been a thorough and rigorous process of self-evaluation with members of the Executive working in small groups to present the trends, issues and targets to the Executive as a group. The School Plan will be in draft form by the end of 2011. The plan which will reflect the State Department of Education and Communities (DEC) and regional DEC priorities, will be completed in early 2012 after analysis of our HSC and SC data.

Part of the development of the **School Plan** and analysis of data is the gathering of our achievements and successes in 2011, which are published and distributed early in 2012 to all families. Our "Achievements 2011" booklet is a valued publication in our school as it highlights the social, cultural and academic achievements of our students in the 2011 academic year. Worth a read! Look for it in February 2012.

In addition to our "Achievements 2011" booklet, we will prepare the Annual School Report (ASR) which gives an in-depth analysis of our diagnostic examination data, attendance, post-school destinations and outcomes in relation to the 2011 targets for continuous school improvement .

The ASR is uploaded onto our website before April each year.

Already we have a snippet of information in relation to how well our students have done in the HSC. **Congratulations** to **Hannah Watson** who has been pre-selected for **"Call Back"**, a selection of outstanding performances and projects from HSC dance students. Hannah was selected for the three components of her performance – Major Study, Core Performances and Core Composition. Hannah is an accelerated Year 11 student who did her HSC Dance this year! Congratulations and well done!

Congratulations to HSC Visual Arts students Tegan Baker, Ashlee Dennis-Rice, Tammera Jeffs, Martin King and Georgia Monaghan whose Bodies of Work have been preselected for Art Express. Well done!

And congratulations as well to the HSC Industrial Tech-



nology students, **Kallan Baita, Kurt Linter, Zachary Ross and Mitchell Walker**, whose major works have been selected for **Design Tech.** Wow! What a great start to our HSC successes.

Changing from HSC to Martial Arts, congratulations to outgoing Year 12 student **Rachel Tabley** who won the 2011 World Cup Extreme. Well done Rachel!

I would also like to congratulate **Isobel Cootes**, (new Year 12) for her inclusion in the Australian Women's Football team to compete in China and **Ethan Reay**, (Year 9) who was invited to play in the 2011 United Kingdom Professional Soccer Tour in Europe. Well done Isobel and Ethan.

Still on achievements and success, can I thank and congratulate the Year 12 students from 2009 and 2010 who donated funds for the purchase of a school bus, and the staff volunteers, led by TAS teacher Mr Brendan Mackay, who held sausage sizzle fund raisers for the bus as well. The purchase of our school bus from Mount View High School is proof that every 'little bit' helps and goals and dreams can be achieved by combined effort. Out bus is old, but it is safe and functional. Thank you to Mr Jamie Furner, Head Teacher of Mathematics, who has offered to manage the bus, the bookings and the maintenance. We have a number of suitably licensed staff to drive the bus as needed. I have included the relevant section of our Excursion Policy for parent information in relation to costs for students and kilometres travelled. Whilst we are not planning to make a profit by using the school bus, we must cover costs therefore there is a small charge for student use.

We have also purchased a band trailer (for the bus) for use by music students for the transportation of their musical instruments. We are hoping someone in our school community may donate either the funds or the skills to spray paint the band trailer with "Warners Bay High Performing Arts" on the sides.

Currently we have **major works in progress** with the construction of a lift to enable disabled access to Blocks A, B C and D. It is a work in progress and I am sure the finished product will be invaluable for staff and/or students who have injuries or disabilities.





During the Christmas vacation the **girls' toilets** in C and E Blocks will be upgraded. That means all our student toilets will have been upgraded. We've waited a long time and I know the students will be grateful!

During the holidays, we also hope **15 classrooms** will be painted and re-carpeted as part of our plan to systematically upgrade our learning environment. It's such a big school; such plans take time!

In conclusion, my gratitude always goes to our teaching and ancillary staff who work so hard for our students and our school. My thanks go to Mr Phil Jones, President of the P&C and members of the P&C for tirelessly supporting our school to ensure students have resources for the learning process. Finally, thank you to parents for their support and friendship, and thank you to the students who make leading and managing our school so rewarding.

EXCURSION POLICY

BOOKING THE SCHOOL BUS

- 21 seater + Driver

- Bus bookings and keys are co-ordinated through Mr Furner, Head Teacher Mathematics
- A Class Light Rigid (LR) licence is required
- As well as the driver there must be at least one supervising adult
- Utilising teaching staff to drive the school bus must have minimal impact on student learning. All requests for a suitably licenced driver must have the agreement of the relevant Head Teacher prior to organisational arrangements being completed.
- The bus must be collected and returned to the designated parking area for the bus. Students may load there or at another designated area in the school or in the bus bay on Myles Avenue.
- Minimum cost for usage \$50.00 in local venue range.
- Costs (i) \$5.00 per head per student for local venues up to including and 10kms plus costs of driver and supervising adult.
 - (ii) \$10.00 per head per student for venues over 10kms and up to 50kms from the school plus costs of driver and supervising adult.
 - (iii) Distances over 50kms can be negotiated with the principal for approval.
- Payments need to be made as per the standard practice at the front office with a designation noting payment for use of school bus or payment for cost of driver and/or supervising adult.
- At all times the bus must be left in a clean condition. The driver is to report any maintenance needs or issues immediately to Mr Furner. The log book must be completed for each journey. The bus must be refuelled at the end of each journey using the designated fuel card.






PRINCIPAL'S READING CHALLENGE



New Initiative for Warners Bay High School

During the P&C meeting on 22 November, members of the P&C gave approval for the Principal to submit an application for the Federal Government Chaplaincy and Student Welfare program.

Our submission will request funding for a Student Welfare Officer. The original chaplaincy program has been evaluated and now extended so that schools can employ a Student Welfare Officer to work 20 hours per week to strengthen and support student welfare in the school. Given the changes since the introduction of the original program, I have added a further explanation of the program so that parents are fully informed. Our application for support will be judged alongside many other applications and there is no guarantee that our submission will be successful. However, if we are successful, the program will be financially administered through the P&C with the actual role of the Student Welfare Officer managed through the school.

Jill Hall MP said the Minister for School Education, Peter Garrett, announced that expressions of interest were open on 20 October 2011.

"This is a great opportunity for those interested in providing welfare services under the program, particularly groups which are already active in our community and have experience in welfare, counselling or youth work," Jill Hall MP said.

Question 1: I don't know much about chaplaincy. What can you tell me?

School Chaplaincy is like chaplaincy in other areas of society - a caring presence in institutions like hospitals emergency services, police, the armed services, industry, professional sporting teams, colleges and universities. They provide pastoral care and support programs for members of school communities as requested by the school.

Question 2: What is the likely amount of funding?

The amount promised since August last year is \$20,000 for a standard two-day a week grant.

Question 3: Does a Student Welfare Officer only give pastoral care to students, staff and parents from their own religious background?

No. Whatever religion the Welfare Officer belongs to he or she is obliged to respect the background of all members of school communities with whom they engage.

Question 4: What qualifications does a chaplain or Student Welfare Officer have?

The Federal government has set a Certificate IV in Youth Work or Pastoral Care as a minimum.

Question 5: Do Student Welfare Officers compete with school counsellors?

No. They do not do professional counselling. Their role is to refer students to counselling services in consultation with other welfare staff and the school executive.

Question 6: Who selects the Student Welfare Officer?

An interview panel of three made up of representatives from the school and P&C form a merit selection panel to select an appropriate applicant.

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LONGITUDINAL SURVEYS OF AUSTRALIAN YOUTH RESEARCH SYNTHESIS Are we there yet? Making the successful transition to adulthood NCVER Longitudinal Surveys of Australian Youth

INTRODUCTION

There was a time when leaving school marked the beginning of adulthood. Even though this transition has now lengthened, the traditional markers of a successful transition remain the same: getting a good job, becoming a responsible citizen, establishing a household and having a family.

These markers are seen when young people have:

- gained sufficient education, including literacy and numeracy skills, to give them the ability to complete Year 12 and to keep on learning at the post-school level, as well as at work and from life
- · well-informed career plans
- gained high-quality employment, as seen through their level of earnings, job status and security, job satisfaction, and training and promotional opportunities
- good mental and physical health and stable social relationships.

GETTING ONTRACK

Being either in full-time education or work, or a combination of both — in other words, being fully engaged in society — is a good indicator that a young person is on the right track. Some may take a different, less direct route towards achieving this but it is not necessarily a bad thing; they too may be involved in meaningful activities such as travel, or caring for children or others, or doing volunteer work.

Who might get off track?

But there is a minority who struggles to make a successful transition. They often leave school early and, when they do, find it difficult getting a job. This can increase the chances of further periods of unemployment and be the beginning of a vicious cycle.

This group of young people is sometimes referred to as being 'at risk', a term we should use cautiously, given that the period of youth transition is by its very nature a time of flux when many young people are trying to decide the direction in which they wish to head. Nevertheless, policy-makers and educators need to be aware of the types of things that can hinder a successful transition. These include: having poor literacy and numeracy; living outside a metropolitan area, where there is limited access to further education and to jobs; coming from a low socioeconomic background; and having parents with little education or who are long-term unemployed.

WHAT HELPS YOUNG PEOPLE ACHIEVE A SUCCESSFUL TRANSITION?

Being from a less advantaged background does not have to determine a young person's destiny. Various interventions can help young people overcome obstacles.

School

A good experience at school is important, both for its educational benefits but also because it means the student feels part of a community. For example, getting involved in extra-curricular activities, including sport, has a positive impact on education participation and aspirations.

Good student–teacher relationships are central, particularly for those with low educational motivation or little support from home. Teachers can also help students make subject choices that are relevant to post-school plans for work and study. Well-informed and appropriate careers advice can also motivate low academic achievers to stay at school. And having a wider choice of subjects, both vocational and academic, can encourage students to remain at school for longer.

Financial support

For those living in poverty, it is likely to take more than a positive school environment to get them on the right track. Income support to complete school and go onto post-compulsory education is an important ingredient in making the transition from child to adult a success.

Part-time work

Working part-time while at school can provide young people with valuable work experience and skills, such as team work and time management, which will help them in their future jobs. But too much part-time work can have a negative impact on school performance; finding the right balance between the two can be difficult.




