PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Last Bulletin we posted and/or emailed our **Achievements 2010 booklet** which lists the academic, sporting & cultural

highlights from last year. In this Bulletin I refer you to our Annual School Report (ASR) which will be uploaded onto our website by the end of March. The ASR uses the data provided by the DET Educational Measurement & Statistical Assessment Directorate (EMSAD) to outline value-added growth, comparison to state in HSC, SC, NAPLAN and ESSA and comparison to Similar Education Groups (SEG). The ASR identifies where we have achieved our academic targets and where we will need to focus in 2011 to ensure continuous improvement in student learning outcomes. The ASR has data similar to the data provided by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment & Reporting Authority (ACARA). In NSW all Annual School Reports follow the same template. I commend the ASR to you for review of our strengths and our improvement targets for 2011.

On a different note **may I congratulate Dominic Bizzarri** and **Cody Lucas** for their selection in the Northern NSW Institute of Sport Trans Tasman Tournament in soccer. Well done Dominic and Cody.

It is always a pleasure to congratulate students and staff on their various successes, but please note that I do rely on staff and students to pass the information on to me so that I can include their successes in the Bulletin. Please continue to make this information available.

Congratulations also to **Ashleigh Wells** (Year 12, 2010) whose HSC Body of Work was selected to be hung in the Lake Macquarie City Art Gallery annual showcase of outstanding HSC major works from the region's Visual Arts

students. Well done Ashleigh, what an honour! Congratulations also to her teacher **Ms Renae Rogers (Farrell).**

Congratulations to **Isobel Cootes (Year 10)** who was selected in the Westfield Australian Under 17 Women's National Training Camp as preparation for the Asian Football Confederation (AFC) U-16 Women's Championship Trial 2011. Well done Isobel!

Whilst we still have plenty of time ahead of us prior to the selection and induction of new student leaders 2011-2012. I thought it timely to publish our process for the **Selection of Student Executive** later in this bulletin. LANGUAGES

Japan Quake

This has been a summer of world disasters that we will not forget for a long time. The earthquake and subsequent events in Northern Japan have impacted on all of us, not the least being our friends and colleagues in Japan. It made us realise how many Japanese people and how many places in Japan we are linked to, from our exchange students in Hakodate on the top island, through to our sister school in Asakawa (Fukushima), our long standing sister school Suginami in Tokyo, down to our new link in Kyoto, and even to the bottom island when we used to host students from Hakata. Luckily, so far there has been no loss of life that we are directly related to. However, through copious emails and student interaction on Facebook we know that all Japanese have experienced, and still are suffering. It puts our disappointment about the possible postponement of the September trip to Japan into perspective.

Thanks to a great idea from Mrs Karen Holmes we have put together a "Book of Good Wishes" to send to our sister school Suginami HS in Tokyo. A big thank you to all students who paused, thinking carefully before writing something in the book. And also to all the students, teachers and parents who contributed to the appeal.

Asian Literacy Grants

1. Warners Bay High School Grant:

We have been lucky to receive a grant to enable us to employ two tutors this year. We have been in contact with Eri Takeuchi in Japan and she has agreed to return for a third year to help with all our classes and possibly meet some of our primary school students to introduce them to some Japanese through elective GATS classes in Term 3. We have also just met Li Na, a young woman from Shanghai here studying for a MBA and living in Eleebana who will help us with Chinese in the school community. We've been very fortunate to come across two such competent and friendly young people who are more than happy to help us.

2. Regional Asian Literacy Grant

Mrs Sherwood has been busy with other experienced teachers of senior Japanese and Chinese writing two new courses: Japanese Workplace Beginners and Chinese Workplace Beginners. These courses could be of interest to those students studying Retail, Hospitality and Travel and Tourism who would like some basic language and cultural etiquette skills that relate to the work environment. This will be offered in several schools across the region next year, subject to approval from the Board of Studies.

Kelver Hartley Bequest Program

Through the generosity of this University of Newcastle bequest, we have already started Café Bla-Bla on Monday afternoons for Year 12 French where our students converse



with Remy, a native speaker experienced in working with senior students. Year 10 French will go to the Year 10 French Activity Day on 28 April for a day of immersion and fun filled activities at the university. We're looking forward to the skit they've prepared for the Star Academy session (French version of Idol). Later on in June, Year 12 French will also be attending a HSC Speaking Skills Day. All this has been arranged with the help of the two French lecturers at the University, Marie-Laure Vuaille-Barcan and Alistair Rolls, who are looking forward to meeting our students.

Future Trips

The first parent meeting for the France '12 trip will be held in Term 4. Students and parents should be aware that students are invited to participate on all our overseas trips after they have completed an application. Students must prove themselves worthy of representing WBHS and Australia when overseas with the school.

Year 10 students who are interested in doing Chinese Beginners in the Preliminary Course 2012 and also travelling to China on a school trip (Beijing, Great Wall, Tianamen Square etc), in April, 2012, should introduce themselves to Mrs Biram in the Languages Staff room as we need to ramp up on our organisation for this trip. A draft itinerary and basic costings have been done. It is expected that the first parent meeting for this trip will be in Term 2.

TAS REPORT

It's been a busy, exciting time in TAS during first term this year.

Year 7 students have been involved in a new introduction to Technology program called 'To Infinity and Beyond' which involved them developing a rocket from recycled materials which can support an 'eggstronaut' (egg). This design project also required students to research and complete a persuasive text on a designer of their choice.

Students in Child Studies, Industrial Technology Automotive, Industrial Technology Timber, Food Technology, Textiles Technology, Graphics Technology and Information and Software Technology, have been responding well to their design briefs and have been producing some brilliant work. Examples of these are shown below.

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Whilst we understand that a student's workbook reflects their individuality and personality, we also believe that a student's workbook is a reflection of their commitment to learning.

Workbooks are the basis for student revision and preparation for assessment and as such, the standards expected for students' workbooks at WBHS are:

1 Legibility

In an external examination the marker assesses student knowledge through the written response. Writing that is in pencil, illegible or poorly constructed makes it difficult for the marker to read and this may affect the student's mark.

Students should preferably use blue or black pen, not pencil, unless specified by the teacher or examination rules.

If using fluorescent pens, the writing needs to be easily read

2

Lesson notes should have headings, key words highlighted and each lesson should have the date, (so that missed work can be easily copied). Sentences with correct capitalisation and punctuation should be used unless the teacher

3.

Bookwork should be complete with evidence of any corrections (as per teacher's comments) and organised in sequential order (no gap pages).

4.

Evidence of student pride in their work, no graffiti, sheets glued into appropriate sections, name on book and preferably a cover (to protect the book).

SELECTION OF STUDENT EXECUTIVE - WARNERS BAY HIGH SCHOOL (WBHS) POLICY FOR SELECTION

Rationale

The selection of student leaders at WBHS is based on the merit principle. Applicants demonstrate their skills, experience and passion for leadership through a competitive process involving a panel of school staff and outgoing Year 12 Student Executive.

The process is designed to allow young leaders to outline their leadership at school and community level and to articulate how they would contribute to the school leadership team for school improvement.

Once selected on merit, the new executive team participate in a one day leadership conference led by the Principal and Head Teacher Student Welfare, and joined during the lunch break by Year 10 and Year 11 Year Advisers and the Head Teacher Languages who is responsible for School Ceremonies, Assemblies and the induction of Student Executive. During the day all participants work together to outline their leadership stance and values platforms to come to a shared understanding of leadership concepts and principles. During the workshop students also formulate their leadership action plan for the next 12 months.

At the end of the workshop the new Student Executive, Year Advisers, Head Teacher Languages, Head Teacher Student Welfare and Principal vote for the Captains from the Year 11 cohort. This democratic process ensures that voting for the captaincy positions is based on informed choice in terms of what the students have articulated during the day in relation to their leadership capacity and skills.

This process avoids the 'popularity vote' process where students interested in the captaincy positions present a 2-3 minute speech to a year group outlining their leadership skills and contributions to school life.

Process:

- 1. Applications are sought (in August) from interested students in Years 10 and 11 for the period commencing September of the current year to September the following year. A one page application form is provided where students outline their leadership skills and experiences and how they could contribute to the leadership of the school.
- 2. Applicants are shortlisted by a panel comprising the relevant Year Advisers, Head Teacher Student Welfare, three outgoing Year 12 Student Executive and the Principal.
- 3. Shortlisted applicants are briefed on the interview process by the Principal. Unsuccessful applicants are provided with feedback by the Principal and/or Head Teacher Student Welfare.
- 4. Year 10 and Year 11 applicants are interviewed in year groups by a panel comprising one of the relevant Year Advisers, three available Year 12 Student Executive and the principal. At the end of each day all interviews applicants are debriefed by the panel and the outgoing School Captains.
- Unsuccessful applicants are provided with feedback by the Principal and/or Head Teacher Welfare.
- 5. A Leadership conference is conducted in early September with the new Student Executive led by Head Teacher Student Welfare and Principal, being joined at lunchtime by Year 10 and Year 11 Year Advisers and Head Teacher Languages. Captains from the Year 11 cohort are elected. All other Year 11 nominees become Vice Captains.
- 6. The Student Executive Induction and handover of leadership by the outgoing Student Executive occurs during the Year 12 Graduation ceremony in September each year.

Structure of the Student Executive

- Eight students chosen on merit through interview from Year 11.
- Six students chosen on merit through interview from Year 10.
- Two students elected to represent the Student Representative Council (SRC) from Year 10 or Year 11.

Numbers may vary in relation to the merit selected students in Year 10 and Year 11 depending on the calibre of applicants.
