

Principal's Message

In this Bulletin I have a number of issues/ changes to outline to you, probably the most exciting being the introduction of the new Student Executive including the Captains for the 2012-2013 period. As you would be aware from previous Bulletins, our Student Executive is chosen through a rigorous application and interview process. Once selected, the Student Executive vote for their Captains. It is with much pleasure I introduce to you our Captains for 2012-2013, - Iona McNab and Luke Coleman; and our Vice Captains, - Abbey Bromley, Tanisha Brown, Lauren Bryant, Nick Holmes, Ellen James and Emma McKenzie-Low. These wonderful young leaders are supported by the Student Executive from the year 10 cohort, these being Jordan Elliott, Georgia Fisher, Siobhan Hull, Luke McIvor, India Monaghan, Mark Peters and Jackson Vaughan. I look forward to, as always, working closely with these wonderful young leaders to enhance the governance of our school.

Next, a **change to our Uniform Policy**. From 2013 we have introduced black joggers instead of multi-coloured or white joggers. Our Uniform Committee has endorsed the change and the P&C has ratified the change in our Uniform Policy. There are abundant suppliers who provide black sports shoes and the change will make it easier to reinforce uniform compliance. Given that young feet grow quickly, there will be a six month, "easing in period" for parents to replace worn out joggers/sports shoes with black ones.

Plus, an addition to the options available for girls; —a **tie like" option** in lieu of the black traditional tie. The Student Executive 2011-2012 have designed a very nice option that will be available in 2013 from our Uniform Shop. Of course traditional ties for girls will still be acceptable. I'm sure you'll like the change as much as the girls. Prices will be confirmed for next year.

Significant **changes to curriculum** for students in Years 7-10 will commence in 2013 for implementation into 2014. Please refer to the timeline and specifics detailed later in the Bulletin. Please be assured Head Teachers and related staff have been involved in the consultation process and are keen to begin writing new programs to accommodate the changes.

At the end of Term 3 we celebrated the success of our current Year 12 exiting group and congratulated the students who had excelled in their preparation for the final HSC examinations and school based assessments. Each year we acknowledge the student who has excelled in school based assessments as **Dux of Year 12**. The process we use to determine this prestigious award is published in this Bulletin. This year we have initiated a second prestigious award to recognise the student who scores the highest ATAR in the current HSC year. This award will be presented to the successful student at an appropriate assembly early in the following year. Given that we no longer have a Year 10 School Certificate and Dux we thought it appropriate to have two awards tied to each year's HSC Dux of the school's assessment program

and Dux of the externally examined HSC. I look forward to sharing this additional Dux position with you.

For those who did not attend the Year 12 Graduation this year, our Dux of the school's assessment program was **Anita Sugo**: first in Physics, Mathematics Extension 1, Mathematics Extension 2 and Chemistry, and 6th in English.

Another significant change for 2013 relates to the **Digital Education Revolution** (DER). You may, or may not be aware that the Federally funded DER program finishes at the end of 2013. Thus, the roll-out of laptops ceases. So too the technical support provided by our Technical Support Officers (TSO). After a great deal of discussion at executive level in relation to the sustainability of the program after 2013, it has been decided that the Year 9 cohort in 2013 will not be issued with personal laptops to take home.

Laptops will be assigned to the school for 2013 but these will not be issued to students. They will be available as a "pool" resource for students to use as the need arises, as determined by their teachers. This decision has not been easy. It has been framed around the concern that if we allocate laptops to each individual student, TSO support will not be available in 2014 for the maintenance of the hardware. We live in hope that the DER Federal Government Program will continue but this is not our understanding and we need to make the hard decisions early so as to avoid a catastrophic collapse of a resource. I'm happy to field your concerns but unfortunately there is not a lot we can do as a school to change the demise of funding to the DER program.

Finally, some congratulations.

Congratulations to **Matthew Skinner** (Yr 12) who has been selected in the 2012 NSW Institute of Sport Water Polo Squad. Well done Matt! **Kara Kelly** (Year 12) has been selected to attend the University of Newcastle Girls' Choices Summer School from 2-6 December, 2012. Well done Kara! Congratulations also to **Stephen Morrison** (Yr 9) who has been selected to attend the University of Newcastle "LIVE IT" program from 9-13 December, 2012. Well done Stephen! Have fun! Congratulations to **Mikaela Hide** (Yr 12) who has achieved her Black Belt in Karate after 7 years of hard work. Wow! Well done! **Dominic Bizzari** (Yr 12) has been selected to tour Brazil and Argentina as a member of the 2012 School Sport Australia Football Team

early in 2013. Well done Dom! What a finish to your HSC year. Good Luck!

Finally, congratulations to Warners Bay High! We had 29 students participate in the University of NSW English Educational Assessment International Competition. Overall, we were awarded 4 Distinctions, 9 Credits and 16 Participation Certificates. Well done students' and thank you Ms Curran for your drive and enthusiasm in co-ordinating our students' participation.

In summary, a lot is happening and great things are being achieved. Thank you for your ongoing support.

WARNERS BAY HIGH SCHOOL

Dux of Year 12 - School Based Assessment

Process:

- 1. The Dux of Year 12 is determined by the rank of students in each HSC Board Developed course.
- 2. The rank recorded on the end of course or Yearly Report will be used. This will include reports for Board Developed courses provided by other accredited educational institutions and private providers eg. Distance Education, TAFE.
- 3. The Dux process will be conducted in Week 9, Term 3
- 4. The Dux of Year 12 School Based Assessment will be determined through the calculation of the best 10 Board Developed units.
- 5. The best 10 units will be calculated as follows:
 - a) All subjects will be 'broken down' into single units
 - b) For subjects with a candidature of 50+ students, the top 10 ranks will be used
 - c) For subjects with a candidature of 25 49 students, the top 8 ranks will be used
 - d) For subjects with a candidature of 10 24 students, the top 6 ranks will be used
 - e) For subjects with a candidature of 1 9 students, the top 3 ranks will be used
 - f) The mark allocated to each rank will be as follows:

Rank	Marks per unit
1	10
2	9
3	8
4	7
5	6
6	5
7	4
8	3
9	2
10	1

- 6. If there are two or more students with the highest score when calculating the best 10 units, the Dux of Year 12 School Based Assessment will be determined by the student as:
 - a) The highest score when the formula outlined above has been applied; and
 - b) The highest number of 'first rankings' in courses studied.Rationale for this change: Subject = Mathematics, Course = Extension 1, Extension 2, Advanced etc.


STEVEN HERRICK

For individual photographs and interviews, students will continue to be asked if they are prepared for the photograph and/or interview to occur, and parents will be contacted.



SOCIAL SCIENCE-

Yr 9 and 10 Marine Studies Excursion

On 12 October, 2012, students from Years 9 & 10 Marine Studies elective classes went on an educational excursion to Taylor Made Fish Farms and the Australian Shark and Ray Centre; both on Marsh Road at Nelson Bay.

The group visited the fish farm for the first half of the day where we were given a private tour of the aquaculture farm. Here, they raise Barramundi to 'plate size' ideal for distribution. On the tour, the company's practices, daily routines and methods for sustainably growing the fish were explained. The recycled water from the fish tanks is used to grow hydroponic vegetables. The initiative and large scale of the business were interesting, with a highlight of the tour being the opportunity to meet and feed 'Big Barry.'

After an exciting and interesting hands-on tour of the fish farm, the group headed down the road to the Shark and Ray Centre and the opportunity to swim, feed and interact with fish, sharks, and stingrays of varying sizes. Many were unable to resist this offer. Meanwhile others used rods to feed the fish. An unforgettable experience which was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

This has been a tiring and rewarding experience which has enhanced and given great detail and understanding to many of the concepts which have been learnt in class – with the addition of a fun, and interactive way of learning.



Social Science - International Studies

The Year 9 International Studies students have spent time learning about the major religions of the world. We have investigated Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Buddhism, Judaism and a number of Chinese religions.

As a class we have participated in activities significant to each of the belief systems. Starting on 20 July, followers of Islam were strictly following Ramadan.

Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, and a time when Muslims across the world will fast during the hours of daylight. It is a time when Muslims try to give up bad habits and practise fasting which is intended to help teach self-discipline, self-restraint and generosity. It also reminds people of the suffering of the poor, who may rarely get to eat well.

The end of Ramadan is marked by a big celebration called 'Eid-ul-Fitr', the Festival of the Breaking of the Fast.



To mark this cultural event we decided to hold a feast of our own. Students took the time to share with fellow classmates an assortment of breads and dips to mark the end of Ramadan which occurred on 18 August.

FRANCE '2012 TRIP

In September this year, thirty-four students and four teachers embarked on a whirlwind tour of France. It was survival of the fittest: getting to the top of the Eiffel Tower in a storm; seeing how many girls could fit in one dormitory room with only one shower and two power-points; eating as many chocolate crepes and Carambars as possible; climbing 500 steps to get to the top of Mont Saint Michel; squashing as many suitcases as possible into one taxi; and playing soccer in as many different locations as permitted, or not....

We also made new friends at a high school in Amiens with whom we will keep in contact. Robert de Luzarches Lycee (High School) is situated to the north west of Paris and is a private school with international links and a strong English department. Apart from meeting their email buddies, the students were impressed with the three course lunch that the students sit down to every day — a bit of a step up from a sandwich!

Almost all of the teachers stayed awake through the late session at Moulin Rouge. It was worth it for the spectacle and experience, and it finished off a lovely day in Paris seeing the Mona Lisa, walking the Champs Elysees and finding our way through the Arc de Triomphe.

It is great to be able to say that a lovely time was had by all, even the teachers, because all of the students were responsible and responsive in sometimes challenging situations. Deadlines had to be met, clothes had to be sorted, money had to be organised...

A great time was had by all. – This was definitely a school excursion that no-one will forget!



WHAT IS THE AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM?

The Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA), in collaboration with states and territories, has developed agreed Australian curriculum for English, Mathematics, Science and History. Each of these learning areas includes content statements that represent essential learning for all Australian students.

HOW IS AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM BEING IMPLEMENTED IN NSW?

In NSW, the Board of Studies has worked closely with teachers and key education stakeholders to develop syllabuses that include Australian curriculum content and further detail that clarifies learning. As a result of this work, Kindergarten to Year 10 syllabuses provide direction to ensure greater consistency between NSW schools.

WHEN WILL THE NEW SYLLABUSES INCORPORATING AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM BE TAUGHT IN NSW?

WHAT WILL MY CHILD LEARN AT SCHOOL?

The new syllabuses build on the strength of the existing NSW curriculum. Many features of the new K–10 English, Mathematics, Science (incorporating Science and Technology K–6) and History syllabuses are retained. Literacy and numeracy remain important areas of focus in K–6, where essential foundation skills are developed.

The syllabuses identify the knowledge, understanding, skills, values and attitudes that students are expected to develop in each learning area. They are designed to provide flexibility for teachers to develop their teaching and learning programs to meet the needs of their students.

YEARS 7-10

English

- Students build on and refine their language skills through activities involving speaking and listening, reading and viewing, and writing and representing.
- They learn about language and literature through working with a wide range of print, spoken, visual, media, multimedia and digital texts.
- They interpret and express their views on what they hear, see and read.
- They create written and digital texts, and deliver formal and informal presentations.
- Students study a wider range of texts that give them experience of quality literature, Australian works, multiculturalism, Aboriginality and Australian identity, and Asian perspectives.

Mathematics

- Students develop their mathematical knowledge, skills and understanding through a range of learning experiences across:
 - number and algebra, eg financial mathematics, ratios and rates, and equations
 - measurement and geometry, eg angle relationships, trigonometry and Pythagoras' theorem
 - statistics and probability, eg data collection and representation.
- They develop their problem-solving skills, and mathematical reasoning and communication.
- Students develop a deeper understanding of statistics and probability.

Science

- Students develop their skills in science inquiry through hands-on practical experiences, including student research projects.
- They further develop their understanding about how evidence-based scientific knowledge explains the Physical World, Earth and Space, the Living World and the Chemical World.
- Students learn more about the importance of the contribution and influence of science in their own lives and in finding solutions to personal, social and global issues.

History

- Students gain a broad understanding of world and Australian history from ancient to modern times through the teaching of historical overviews.
- They gain a deeper knowledge of history through the study of depth studies such as Ancient India, the Ottoman Empire and Japan under the Shoguns.
- Students learn about 20th century Australian history through the Australians at War and Rights and Freedoms depth studies.
- They experience an inquiry-based approach to learning, developing key historical skills in research, source analysis and communication.

In addition to subject-based content, all syllabuses address important contemporary themes and general capabilities as students prepare to live and work successfully in the 21st century. These include Australian curriculum cross-curriculum priorities and general capabilities and other learning across the curriculum areas identified by the Board of Studies.


