## Year 7 Focus Days

I was lucky enough to attend the Year 7 Focus Days at Morriston in the first week of this term. The Year Advisers, Chris English and Ashley Forbes, did a wonderful job organising these days, and workshops run by Mrs Brown and Mrs Curran were well received. The students' participation and enthusiasm were excellent, and there were many smiles at the end of both days. I ran a workshop with the boys on our school policy on "Preventing and Responding to Student Bullying", and Mrs Curran ran a similar workshop with the girls. Students should have taken home a copy of our policy and I invite any parents who would like to talk more about that policy and how we handle harassment and bullying to ring me at the school.

## Personal Property at School.

Understandably, students often wish to bring their own property to school. Often these are expensive personal items such as i-pods, phones and skateboards. Occasionally these items are lost or stolen. 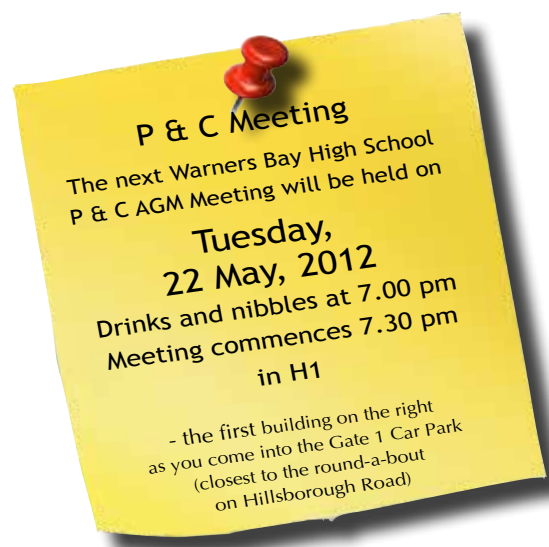
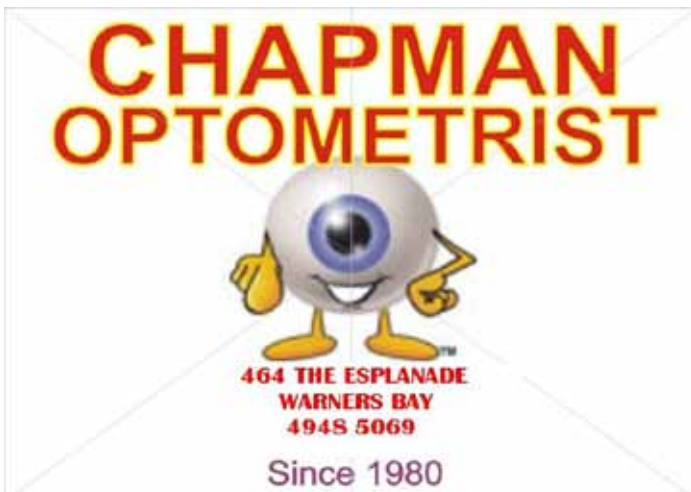
**Advanced information for your diaries:** we have booked **Celia Lashlie** again on Wednesday evening, 27 June to conduct a **parent workshop** from 7.00 pm - 9.00 pm addressing "the world of adolescent boys and what they need from us, the adults in their lives." ## Newcastle and Lake Macquarie Careers Expo – Year 10 Excursion

The Newcastle Lake Macquarie Careers and Training Expo is an annual event, (managed by Career Links), which connects people to career options, enabling them to make informed decisions about their future. The Expo is the largest event of its kind in the region, attracting over 100 local and interstate exhibitors.

From leading education and training providers, to some of the Hunter's largest employers, the Career and Training Expo provides a unique opportunity for visitors to speak face-to-face with a variety of organisations and discuss available career and training options. Year 10 students will be attending this event on Friday, 18 May.

## Year 10 WBHS Mini Careers Expo & Subject Selection Night

This event will take place on Tuesday 29 May (Week 6) between 6.30pm – 8.30pm. The evening is designed to assist Year 10 students and their parents to choose subjects for Years 11 and 12. WBHS Teachers and Head Teachers will provide information about specific courses on offer next year. In addition, other organisations will provide information and answer questions about courses and future career options (eg the University of Newcastle, ADF, Newcastle Careers Information Service... etc.).

A number of speakers will provide important information about the structure and rules relating to Preliminary and HSC courses. Enquiries should be directed to Mr White.

## WBHS Careers News – May Issue

All Year 10 students have had an eight page career news magazine emailed to their school account. We urge all students to read this as it will provide them with an insight into career options. It is also important to be aware of dates for courses, apprenticeships and open days provided by various organisations.

## Year 10 Subject Selection Careers Seminars

These seminars have commenced this term and are designed to prepare students for Year 11/HSC subject selections occurring later this term. Every Year 10 student will have participated in these seminars by Week 8. In small groups students discuss their career aspirations and are given information about HSC guidelines, TAFE, Uni and ATAR, apprenticeships/traineeships and other post school training and employment options. Students are encouraged



to ask questions that are related to their own specific career interests.

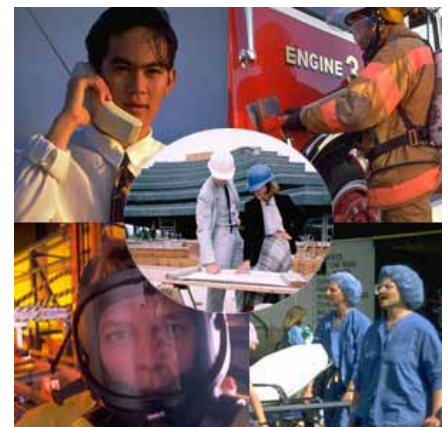
## Quality Learning Expo (QLE)

This program was launched at the start of this term with a special formal assembly. QLE provides all Year 10 students with an interview situation where they respond to an interview panel, comprised of a Year 9 student, a community member and a WBHS staff member. # WHAT'S HAPPENING IN TAS COMPUTING?

## Year 7 TAS: Computing

Mr Ford's Year 7 students have been learning computer aided drawing techniques, using various types of software, such as *Google Sketchup* and *Prodesktop*.

Mrs Mangovski's Year 7 students have been learning about internet safety and completing their "All About Me" projects using interactive slideshow software, called *Prezi*. This term students will be creating electronic e-cards using *Adobe Flash*. If time allows, they will be introduced to computer programming concepts using *Scratch* and *Kodu* software.

## Year 8 TAS: Computing

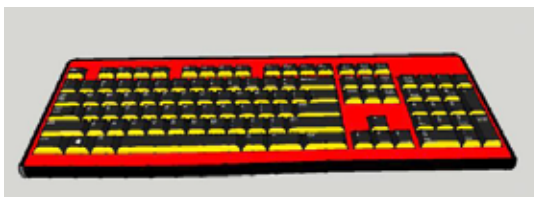

Basic *Adobe Photoshop* skills and planning techniques are used to develop students' creativity and communication skills.

## Year 9 Graphics Technology

In addition to traditional technical drawing skills, our Year 9 Graphics students began learning to use a 3D Computer Aided Design Software called *Google Sketchup*. This is a fantastic program available on all DER laptops. This term students will work on perfecting these skills to create more complex 3D objects. To the Principal

Newcastle Buses operate over 130 dedicated school routes in the morning and again in the afternoon, in addition to our normal service routes.


A large proportion of those services carry students from more than one school. In fact some dedicated routes convey students from up to 8 schools.

As many of the school uniforms are similar, it is becoming increasingly difficult to distinguish one school from another by observation of their uniform.

Many of the children simply assume the bus driver knows they need or don't need a particular service and therefore do not signal the driver to pull over. This not only impacts on the late running of the service, with drivers unnecessarily leaving and re entering the line of traffic, but with a greater chance of children being left behind.

This is of greater concern in the morning, when a number of students for different schools wait at a common bus stop.

I would appreciate your help in conveying to your students the importance of signalling the bus as it approaches their bus stop. If you could talk to your students who catch the bus to or from school and put the following notice into your weekly newsletter I would be very grateful.
