As the usual programs roll on, new directions and initiatives are occurring in the Department of Education and Communities (DEC). The changes are through both State initiatives and Federal Government Partnerships and will make significant changes to the way we operate in government schools.

The Every Student, Every School (ES,ES) initiative changes the structure of funding of support for students with disabilities. Parents of students School Learning Support Officers (SLSO) have been informed via letter of the changes thus far. Whilst there has been some negative media coverage for ES,ES, please be assured that students will continue to receive support from the SLSO's and relevant teaching staff, albeit through a changed framework.

The current Support Teacher Learning Assistance (STLA) role ceases at the end of this term. In its place is a new role for staff entitled Learning and Support Teacher (LAST). What's in a name? Some small changes to how students with disabilities are supported in their learning and a new focus on providing more professional learning for teachers so that they are better supported and equipped to manage students with disabilities in their classrooms.

In terms of staffing, Ms Jo Riley held the STLA position for 0.8 and Head Teacher Student Welfare 0.2 making that a full-time position. Ms Riley will continue as Head Teacher Student Welfare and LAST Teacher. She will be supported by an additional 0.5 (2 days one week, 3 Days the other week) LAST teacher, Mr Chris Maher. We share Mr Maher with Bidabbah and Eleebana primary schools. The draft role statement for the LAST teachers is included later in the Bulletin.

The second significant change will occur through the Empowering Local Schools National Partnerships (ELS). Our school was successful in its application to be part of the first round of schools to pilot the changes. See the fact sheet below for a summary of the changes.

Watch this space; we live in interesting times. As a Principal with 16 years principal-ship experience I am confident we can make these new structures and processes work for us. I am supported by a great executive team and hard working staff and, with the ongoing support of our parent community, Warners Bay High will continue to be a centre of

We have also been successful in three other applications for funding. I applied for \$20,000 for 3 years to employ a Student Welfare Officer to add to the support provided to our students by the Welfare Team and Counsellors. The role statement is not yet finalised, but when it is, we will form a merit selection panel to select the appropriate person for our school. The selected applicant will work 2-3 days/week as determined by the role statement.

Under the new model there has been a decrease in the number of SLSO Our second big win, was the awarding of \$20,000 from the Lake staff supporting students with disabilities in our school however, we will Macquarie Grants program to update our school oval. EMPOWERING LOCAL SCHOOLS FACT SHEET

- 229 schools across all ten regions have been selected to participate in the ELS initiative
- All 229 schools will participate in the LMBR first phase implementation program
- The schools will receive between \$40,000 and \$50,000 to use for greater flexibility in decision-

Schools will be able to expend their money in categories that support their school plan and its targets:

- Teaching and learning resources
- Staffing
- Governance (Community consultation and decision-making/support for children's learning)
- Infrastructure
- Professional learning
- School leaders and leadership teams will have a suite of professional learning that will be co-ordinated with the training provided under LMBR
- Guidelines are being developed with the Principal Associations simplified reporting
- Schools will be involved in a Commonwealth evaluation process at the end of 2012. This will inform Phase 2 of the National Partnership
- The flexibility that occurs as a result of the LSLD reforms will be available to the ELS schools as it will to the other 2,238 schools across the system

The schools on the ELS will not have the additional power:

- to hire and fire teachers
- to get rid of permanent positions
- Schools will receive funding by the end of next week when they have signed their participation

Guidance for the role of the Learning and Support Teacher

The Learning and Support Teacher will, through the school's learning and support team, provide direct and timely assistance to students in regular classes with additional learning and support needs and their teachers. Many of these students come from diverse cultural, linguistic and socio-economic backgrounds.

The Disability Standards for Education 2005 provides the context for the role and activities of the Learning and Support Teacher.

Emphasis in the role will reflect school priorities and programs that support students with additional learning and support needs.

The Learning and Support Teacher will:

- · model exemplary classroom practice when tailoring adjusted learning programs for students with additional learning needs
- provide direct support for students with additional learning and support needs including the areas of social integration, language and communication, literacy, numeracy and behaviour. This may include students with confirmed disabilities.
- plan, implement, monitor and evaluate teaching programs for students with additional learning and support needs in conjunction with regular classroom teachers
- · provide professional advice, support and mentoring to classroom teachers on:
 - how best to cater for the diverse learning needs in their classrooms, and
 - how to effectively work in partnership with families to maximise learning opportunities for students at school and at home
- provide professional advice and assistance about students with additional learning needs to the school's learning and support team
- assist with professional learning for class teachers and School Learning Support Officers within their school and local network of schools where appropriate.

In undertaking their work the Learning and Support Teacher will not be used to provide relief for teachers/executive or to establish a separate class.

INFORMATION ABOUT SCHOOLS IN THE EMPOWERING LOCAL SCHOOLS NATIONAL PARTNERSHIP

- Networks of ELSNP schools will be established for sharing of expertise and experiences.
- Information sessions will enable principals to ask questions about the ELSNP initiative.
- Schools on ELSNP will have the opportunity to participate in the initial implementation phase of the LMBR integrated solution.
- New tools will be available to support principals in the transition to increased local decision making.
- . Support from LMBR will be individualised for each school
- Schools and their communities will be empowered to make local decisions to address the learning needs of students.
- Increased professional learning for all staff will be available
- The Empowering Local Schools National Partnership will operate within existing and subsequent Award conditions.
- There will be no reduction in the state public education budget as a result of Local Schools, Local Decisions. This applies to ELSNP schools.
- Schools receive a funding grant of between \$40,000 and \$50,000 to move to an increased level of decision making at the school.

Sponsored by the French Studies Department at the University of Newcastle and the Kelver Hartley Bequest Program, the students found out about the generous scholarships and exchange tours to France available to students of French; ate some patisseries (miam, delicieux!); played petanque (French bowls) under the sails next to the Great Hall; learnt about sms text symbols in French; and picked up some extra vocabulary in a new game.

Participation Pathway Options That Work (PPOTW) TAFE Year 10 Outreach Program




EXCITING COMPETITION HAPPENING IN THE LIBRARY





















