

### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

It's been a busy time with the Olympics but a busy time at Warners Bay High as well. May I congratulate **Alex Winner (12)** who won one of the most significant independent Australian Art Prizes, **The Moran Contemporary Photographic Prize - Secondary Schools Section**. A record 330,409 entries in all categories were received from across Australia. The 'Moran Prize' is the world's wealthiest art prize with a combined total of AUD \$300,000 in monies and prizes.

Alex was one of 16 finalists for the 2012 Moran Contemporary Photographic Schools Section Years 11-12 category. What was also exciting was that two other WBHS students **Maddison Moulton (12) and Lauren Moulton (12),** were also in the 16 finalists from across NSW. What a fantastic achievement for WBHS students and the CAPA staff! All finalists' and semi-finalists works can be viewed online at www.moranprizes.com.au

What was also very exciting was that WBHS has now had wins in this prestigious national competition for three years out of four. Thank you to the CAPA staff in particular the Head Teacher **Mrs Trudy Farmer and Ms Donna Pfister** who assisted Alex with his entry. Alex's entry will be framed and hung with other national Moran Photographic prize winners **Wanagi Zable-Andrews and Tamara Schier** in our foyer. How clever are we?

Still in CAPA, congratulations to **Siobhan Hull (12), India Monaghan (10) and Sarah Stocker (11)** who, along with teacher **Mr Ashley Forbes,** were part of the Hunter Singers group who received one Gold and two Silver medals at the World Choir Games in Cincinatti. Wow! Well done! Now on to the Basketball Court; congratulations to **Daniel Borbajo (12) and Jacob Rauch (10)** who played in the NSW Country Under 18's Mens Championships for the NSW Basketball Carnival. Their team the Newcastle Hunters Under 18's, were being undefeated and crowned the Basketball NSW Country Champions. Well done boys!

Congratulations also to **Dominic Bizzarri (12)**, who was selected in the NSW All Schools Football Squad which played in Townsville last week. Well done Dom!

Congratulations to **Laurence TeBay (11)** who has been selected for the National Youth Science Forum in January 2013. Well done, Laurence!

Congratulations also to **Josh Chock** ((9), who was selected to play soccer in Singapore this September with Northern NSW Football.

A Step Closer. Last Year I took the opportunity to apply for the student welfare officer position under the National Chaplaincy Program. Our submission for Round 2 funding was successful however, the Chaplaincy Program was subject to a High Court Challenge and funding was suspended. Last week **Mr Phil Jones, President of the P&C,** received the paperwork in relation to the funding. I nominated the P&C as our incorporated body for receipt of the funds as the Federal Government requires receipt of funding. Phil and I signed the funding agreement and are hopeful the money will be released in the near future.

I applied for a Student Welfare Officer to work 20 hours per week to assist our full range of students, not just those with behavioural or learning needs. When the funding arrives, we will have \$10,000 for the remainder of 2012 and \$20,000 for each of 2013 and 2014. Our funding allocation is \$55,000 which includes GST of \$5,000.

While we have been waiting for the program monies to be released, the executive have brainstormed the programs we currently operate to support and assist our students and identify where there are gaps in support. From this we have drafted a role statement for the Student Welfare Officer.

While we are waiting for receipt of the funding we will finalise the role statement for consideration at the next P&C Meeting on 28 September and begin the recruitment process. This will be a part-time position of up to 20 hours / week for the remainder of 2012 and all of 2013 and 2014. An expression of interest including the qualifications and expertise requirements of the position will be published in the next Bulletin and promoted to the school community. Once we finalise the qualifications and role statement please promote the concept to suitable applicants.

**Empowering Local Schools (ELS).** As you know from the previous Bulletin we have been selected as one of 229 schools to pilot the ELS project. As this stage, we know we will be trialling the new LMBR processes for administration, financial management and student record keeping. This process will begin in Term 4. Currently key personnel from SASS and the teaching service are undergoing training.

We have received our one-off \$50,000 grant as part of the trial process. This has settled nicely into our bank account and we can use in whatever way we determine best meets our needs. It's not enough for 6 permanent classrooms and a performance space to replace our demountable city (which is my dream that I won't give away), so we will need to determine other priorities. (It doesn't hurt to dream especially in the year of the Olympics!)

Staff and parents (through the P&C) have been briefed on the ELS program - as much as I know at this stage - and we have commenced our "big picture" thinking.

My question to staff, parents and our community is this... "If we could make a change to what we currently do to make our school better for students and their learning, what would we do?"

Let's not worry at this stage if we have the authority to do things radically differently, let's just dream of the desired outcomes. If you have any ideas, please email them to me on sharon.parkes@det.nsw.edu.au and I will add them to our growing list.

The ELS will give us more flexibility to meet our needs. If you want to know more, please regularly refer to the DEC website http://www.schools.nsw.edu.au/news/els/index. php for the latest information.

In Term 4 we will 'see' our new **Resource Allocation Model** (**RAM**) which will give us the scope to try new ways of do-

ing things to meet the learning needs of our students both now, and into the future. We live in exciting times!

In the meantime, while we wait for more resources to meet our needs, may I thank the hundreds of parents and families who have paid both their subject contribution fee and school contribution fee. The subject contribution fee pays for consumables over and above minimum course requirements to allow students to gain valuable skills and experiences in various courses. These consumables are purchased locally and we must pay our bills, so thank you to those parents and families who have already assisted us with this process.

School Contributions are a voluntary fee which allows the school to purchase equipment and resources above the minimum standards provided to us through the Department of Education and Communities (DEC). Last year we purchased many additional resources for students including musical equipment, a music trailer for our band, air conditioning for another 6 classrooms, additional seating, sound-proofing of 3 classrooms, data projectors such that nearly all classrooms now have a data projector and much more. These funds, together with the fantastic donation of \$..... from the P&C ensured that Warners Bay High School students have the best resources to support their learning.

If you have not had a chance yet to pay your School Contributions or you hadn't realised how much we need your support, please pay what you can before the end of the school year.

Parents who need financial assistance for Subject Contributions, uniforms or books, should enquire at the front office for an application form. Your privacy will be respected.

A new permanent staff member. Recently the merit selection panel of Mr Phil Jones (P&C President), Ms Peta O'Keefe (Head Teacher Teaching & Learning) and myself selected **Ms Hayley Cummins** from a strong field of applicants for the English/Drama position. This position replaces **Ms Marie Darroch** who has retired and who is very much missed by our budding authors and gifted and talented writers. Ms Cummins, who is now on Maternity Leave, will join our staff early in Term 1, 2013. We look forward to having Ms Cummins on board with us in a permanent capacity next year.

Finally, may I encourage you to encourage your child if they are aged between 15 and 19 of age to participate in the **Mission Australia's 2012 Youth Survey** which can be undertaken in the student's own time until it closes on Friday, 17 August. The survey is available online and can be accessed at www.mayouthsurvey.com.au

In summary, there is a lot happening this term (as always), particularly as we prepare our students for the HSC. Thank you for your ongoing support.

The continual success of Warners Bay High School in this competition is a testament to the cleverness of our students and the teaching provess of the faculty. Well done!





### FROM THE SUPPORT FACULTY

The Support Faculty has been fortunate in gaining an additional 0.5 Learning and Support Teacher (LAST), Mr Chris Maher, who has been an Itinerant Teacher at WBHS and its partner primary schools for a number of years. As the LAST, Mr Maher will complement the Support Faculty in providing additional student support in all areas of learn-

ing and behaviour. Mr Maher comes to us highly qualified and is a valued member of not only the Support Faculty, but Warners Bay High School.

As Head Teacher Welfare, I have been coordinating the 'SHINE' program held at the Willow Uniting Church and implemented by a highly committed and well-trained team of youth workers. SHINE is not a religious program, however, we are grateful for the Willow United Church in allowing us to use their facilities. Due to the success of the program and positive outcomes achieved by students, the Newcastle Rotary Group have kindly donated \$700 towards the future implementation of the SHINE program.

We are now coming up to an important time of the year for students entering Year 7 in 2013. This time of the year evokes many fears and worries for parents as their children leave Primary School and enter the world of High School. Worries about safety issues on the road and on public transport, isolation when at home alone and peer pressure resulting in risk taking are all common concerns parents have about their children.

#### WHAT TEENAGERS THINK PARENTS WORRY ABOUT

Young people were asked in a survey to list what teenage issues they thought parents worry about (A. Fuller, 2004). They thought the teenage issues parents worried about the most included drugs, education, alcohol, peer influences, safety while socialising, sexual activity, making wrong

decisions, immorality and diet. Interestingly, their children's happiness was not one of the things they thought parents worried about.

#### SOME BATTLES NEED TO BE FOUGHT HEAD ON:

At least a third of young people worry and it may be that worrying is helpful in preparing people in case bad things happen to them. However, too much worrying can stop young people from attempting new activities and 'having a go'. It is useful for parents to show young people how to overcome fears and worries where it is possible and safe to

do so.

As children get older, their worries become much more specific and more complex. Before they reach school age, children tend to worry about imaginary and supernatural threats such as monsters, as well as separation from parents. Early primary school children worry mostly about threats to their physical wellbeing, but by late primary and early

secondary school the worries shift. At this stage, young people are more likely to be concerned about their social standing with peers, and their level of ability at school. The large majority of students in high school have high levels of anxiety over their ability to manage their school work, complete assignments and homework, and pass their exams.

#### WHAT CAN WE DO ABOUT IT?

Warners Bay High School has an enormous amount of support available to assist our young people, from even the early years in secondary schooling to develop educational resilience and reduce anxiety. By working collaboratively with families, students and the school, students can be shown ways to reduce their levels of anxiety and increase their confidence in managing school work.

Personnel are available to support students including Year Advisers, the Head Teacher Welfare and Learning Support, Learning and Support Teachers and programs such as the school's Homework Centre for students and parents. As students enter Year 7 and throughout the early years of high school, important habits can be formed through consistency and encouragement. Simple study techniques including daily revision and study, promoting learning as a fun activity and setting goals are some of the many ways we can prepare our young people early so that the worries and anxieties about assignments and exams later in secondary schooling can be minimised. Having a well-balanced lifestyle with a

combination of family time, fun time with friends, sports and hobbies and school study will make a huge difference to how your child manages the challenges throughout high school.

Most importantly we must remember that it is our child's happiness that matters most!!!

Learning and studying can be fun. Why not encourage your child to come along to the Warners Bay High School Homework Centre???

It is available for students on a show up and take advantage basis. Afternoon tea is provided.

Students may use the time for quiet study and use of library facilities, to get help with homework or to go over work from class. Mr Briggs, who provides tutoring support to the school will be running a **Junior Work**, **Study and Time Management Skills course** during Homework Help over the next few weeks. He will run a similar course at a senior student level next term.

Homework Help is supervised by our dedicated School Learning Support staff, assisted by volunteer education students from the University of Newcastle and senior WBHS students. It has developed a wonderful community atmosphere where students from all years can help each other out. Often the younger students can take advantage of the first hand knowledge that our older students have of various assignments and assessment tasks.

The Learning Hub is an area where the school **welcomes the input and assistance of the community**. If you are able to lend a hand with Homework Help it would be greatly appreciated. Often the students just need assistance to interpret a question. The more help, support and involvement we can offer, the better for all.

# MATHEMATICS FACULTY REPORT



All Years 7 and 8 students were provided with a specific homework book which the teachers use to set specific homework. Please ask to have a look at your child's homework book.

We are anxiously awaiting the results as the students are aware of the importance and significance of receiving a certificate in these competitions.


The Year 8 Marine Studies classes have all lessons in the rooms with fish tanks to take advantage of the calming qualities the fish bring to a classroom. Students learn how


