ATTENDANCE



- not been explained with a returned letter to the roll call teacher
- been explained but with an unjustified reason for this absence.

Unjustified reasons include any explanations that pertain to the lack of organisation or general due diligence of the students involved, e.g. sleeping in, missing the bus, forgetting wallet etc. Unless there are exceptional circumstances or teacher error, the school will not reprint student reports to adjust absence details.

Exemption forms are available outside Ms Dal Zotto's office for students taking leave for holidays, operations or other exceptional circumstances. If Dr Parkes approves the leave it wil not be counted as absences on the student's record.

performed including **Wolfgang**, the **Stage Band** and the **Concert Band**. This was a successful night and was enjoyed by students, staff and parents.





TECHNOLOGY NEWS

School APP (Beta Trial) – During Term 4 WBHS will be trialling a school app which will be freely available to all stakeholders. This app will have a "push-out" focus and will be a handy source of information for students and parents alike. Although it would be handy to notify and receive parent notes regarding absences online, at this stage we do not have a secure system for online

processing of these notes, so attendance will remain paper based for the foreseeable future. If you would like to be part of the Term 4 trial, please email me at tobias.husband@det.nsw.edu.au. I would certainly appreciate any feedback from the user's perspective while it is in the development stage. A decision on whether to proceed with the app will be made in December at which point in time it will become available as an Android App as well.

The school app features push notifications, Alerts, parent eForms, Events, News, School eNews Newsletters, Maps with GPS, Social Media Integration, documents and a Photo Gallery.



Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) Revolution

The DERvice Revolution has entered its final year and apart from one last year of TSO support in 2014, (yet to be confirmed), there will be no further issuing of devices or maintenance provided by the DEC.

Warners Bay High has invested in a series of high powered Wi-Fi units which, when coupled with the existing DEC wireless infrastructure, will provide complete BYOD access to all students.

What is BYOD? - BYOD refers to students choosing to bring a personally owned, school-approved device to school for the purpose of learning which can connect to the DEC wireless (this is 5Ghz only - 2.4Ghz devices are not supported).

In 2014, all students may choose to be part of the voluntary BYOD program. A whole school survey will be undertaken over the next few weeks to ascertain the expected take-up rate of this offer. It is important to understand that **the school takes no responsibility** for 'BYODevices' and no technical support will be available aside from the initial set-up. Students must sign and return a permission note to the Front Office before using their personal device at school. This note will be made available in the last two weeks of term and will enable me to check the specifications of their device and set them up with appropriate proxy settings and passwords.

All students entering the BYOD program will be asked to **donate** their old DER laptop on a voluntary basis. This is not a condition of entering the program but will assist us in providing sets of laptops for classroom use in Years 7-9.

A detailed policy brochure will be available on the school website. A list of recommended devices that can be purchased for 2014 can also be found in the Technology section of the school website along with a BYOD Checklist.

<u>Japan</u>

Tour 2013



20 September - 2 October 2013

At 9.30pm on the last day of Term 3 our travel group of seventeen boarded and prepared for the eight hour Qantas flight to Japan. We arrived in Tokyo to find our own personal guide and private bus waiting to whisk us away on a day of sightseeing.

We visited a number of temples including a stop at the Imperial Palace Plaza and the Meiji Jingu Shrine. We enjoyed a Sumida River Cruise from Asakusa to Hamarikyu Garden then we headed off to lunch at a Ginza Restaurant. The afternoon was spent shopping at Harajuku and checking out the Shibuya scramble crossing where up to 70 000 people cross at a time in peak periods.

The next day involved shopping before lunch at Zauo Restaurant, then heading off to Ryogoku Kokugikan for an afternoon of Sumo. Students were entertained by a sumo competitor's 'girlfriend'. Some students were in disbelief that sumo competitors are considered sex symbols within Japan.

Akihabara, known as electric town, was the only place where the boys managed to out shop the girls. That night we ventured out to Ninja Akasaka, a ninja theme restaurant which involved completing a ninja training obstacle course, devouring an eight course meal and watching a private ninja magic show.

Our last day in Tokyo was spent at Disneyland, where students lined up for hours waiting for rides, wore silly hats, got drenched in a downpour and smiled like small children when the evening parade went by.

We headed to Lake Biwa (which is located in the middle of Japan and is 670.4 km²) for three days of relaxation. What we got was a number of cultural activities, a visit to a local school, water sports and involvement in the preparation and cooking process of our nightly meals. Of course there were a number of shopping opportunities, where students spent their time stocking up on pocky (chocolate covered pretzel sticks) and which they consumed that evening.

Hiroshima was a sobering place where we wandered the Peace

Park looking at the memorials, visited the museum, and had the opportunity to attend a one-hour testimony and hear first-hand from a Hiroshima A-Bomb Survivor. As this was an emotionally draining experience, we had to recuperate with a healthy dose of shopping and eating.

Our last days were spent in Kyoto where we explored the Gion district taking in the sights of traditional buildings, geisha's walking to their evening bookings and another round of shopping for traditional crafts and speciality foods. A highlight of Kyoto was our visit to the famous Junsei Restaurant, (situated next to the Nanzenji Temple), where we also enjoyed a Maiko experience. The Maiko, Tomitae, attended the restaurant to dance, conduct a tea ceremony with us and partake in traditional games with the students.

It must be noted that all students were brave and tried all the different foods that were offered to them throughout the trip (At time's however, some students' faces looked like we were trying to poison them).

Our last full day in Kyoto was spent on a private bus with a guide visiting temples and shrines such as Kinkakuji Temple, the Japanese Zen Garden at Ryoanji Temple, Nijo Castle and the Kiyomizu Temple which we had discovered the day before in Gion. We had the bus driver and guide drop us off at the Kyoto Handicraft Centre for an hour, which we managed to stretch out for another fifteen minutes, (due to the boys' uncontrollable shopping habit), to purchase prints, kimonos, yukatas (cotton kimonos), china, wooden boxes and other traditional Japanese handicrafts.

Overall it was fantastic trip from which the students and I have come away with lifelong learning experiences and a strong appreciation of other cultures.

On a personal note the teachers very much enjoyed the experience, and would have trouble finding a nicer bunch of students to take overseas. To all of you, who made the trip so memorable, thanks!


