



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

It has been quite a privilege to relieve as Principal for the majority of this term as it has enabled me to gain a greater overview of the many varied programs and activities that occur within such a large school. As the Principal, I have been invited to a number of student activities. I listened to our Year 8 EEE class present their ideas about a tourism project for Lake Macquarie to one of the media officers for Lake Macquarie Council. Year 8 Elective History invited me to the opening of their Museum of Myths and Legends, a very comprehensive and detailed examination of ancient myths, very well presented in their room. I was also able to be present at the Principal's Reading Challenge meeting organised by Ms Helen Clarke, one of our teacher-librarians, to talk to a wide range of students who view reading as a pleasurable and fascinating activity. I was also privileged to be invited to work as a mentor to a group of Year 7 EEE students as they work through a number of the extension and enrichment exercises that form part of our gifted and talented programs.

Another major highlight of my term was my participation in an assembly to celebrate **NAIDOC** week. As I said on that assembly, this was a significant occasion because the idea of the NAIDOC celebrations came from our own Aboriginal students. The Junior Aboriginal Education Consultative Group (AECG) invited Uncle Bill Smith to perform a traditional smoking ceremony. He spoke eloquently about reconciliation and the need for both Indigenous and Non- Indigenous people to work together to look after the land. Members of the Junior AECG participated in the ceremony, led by **Tanisha Brown**, a Year 12 student and our Junior AECG president. My thanks must go to staff members **Ms Lisa Curran**, **Ms Trish Hendrie**, **Ms Amy Cavaretta and Mr Allan**

Briggs for their help. Our Junior AECG was formed two years ago, and has steadily grown in numbers and confidence.

While this newsletter has further examples of recent student performance, I should apologise for not including a number of other notable achievements from earlier in the year. Dr Parkes did leave this information for me, but in the rush of getting my first newsletter out I overlooked the note that mentioned that **Angus Ellis and Lachlan Brennan** spent three weeks during the last school holidays touring Japan as part of the Hastings Koala Orchestra. Both boys play the trumpet, and one of the Musical Directors wrote to Dr Parkes to comment on the boys' professionalism and exemplary behaviour. The other mention was to the school members of the 13 years 4 x 50m Freestyle Relay team who won their event at the Combined High Schools event at April. Belated congratulations should go to **Jackson Ryan, Harrison Gellatly, Bayley Couzens and Nathan Buchholz** on such an incredible performance.

I would also like to report a compliment paid to our students last week. **Mrs Muldoon** took a group of students as part of their French course to a local restaurant. Cambridge University comes to WBHS

On Wednesday the 27 March Mrs Corliss's Year 11 Modern History class had an inspirational visitor, Bryce Sait, from the University of Cambridge. Bryce has just completed his PhD under the supervision of renowned British Historian, Sir Richard Evans. With his research focus on the German Army under the Third Reich, Bryce was able to provide students with insight into Germany under Hitler's regime, the research process and the many benefits of pursuing History as a career. Bryce spoke to students about his research experiences such as visiting Auschwitz, interviewing men who had been soldiers in the German Army and gathering information from primary sources in German archives. This is the second occasion that Bryce has taken valuable time on his short visits home to share his experience with WBHS students. His time and effort are greatly appreciated.

Myths and Legends in Biddabah

After publishing their own children's book on Greek gods and goddesses, Mrs Corliss's Year 8 Elective History class took their books to Biddabah Public School to be read by their target audience on the last day of Term 1. The majority of students came away with a deeper knowledge and different attitude to this part of their course on the study of Australian History since World War II.

SOCIAL SCIENCE

It has been a busy Term 2 for the Social Science Faculty, with there being many opportunities for students to engage in our diverse range of subjects.

We welcomed Ms Alexandria Lucas as a permanent member of our faculty this term. She has become an integral part of our team, bringing experience, energy and a passion for teaching Geography.

Our senior students have been particularly hard working and busy this term. The Year 12 Society and Culture and Geography classes undertook HSC Study Days. Year 12 Geography students undertook an overnight excursion to Port Stephens in May, conducting essential fieldwork for the Ecosystems at Risk Case Study, Stockton Bight. Year 11 Society and Culture students had the privilege of attending an inspiring talk by the Dalai Lama in Sydney in Week 8. The Year 11 Geography students have been working on finalising their Senior Geography Projects. The students have chosen a range of interesting issues for investigation this year and we look forward to seeing the final products. Some of these students, along with those from Year 11 Business Studies and Earth and Environmental Science, will be gearing up for an exciting four day trip to the Snowy Mountains on 14 July.

The Mock Trial team has had some well deserved wins in the Inter-school competition and should be congratulated, along with Mrs Dieleman, on their efforts this term.

Our elective students have also enjoyed a range of activities this term. The Years 9 and 10 Commerce classes have both undertaken fieldtrips to apply their understanding of commercial and legal concepts. Year 10 Commerce students attended Law Week at the Newcastle Court House, where they were given the opportunity to watch a criminal trial in the Supreme Court with a Supreme Court judge and jury. Years 9 and 10 Marine Studies students enjoyed a whale watching excursion to Port Stephens in Week 8 and we had the recent pleasure of judging the cooking skills of the Year 10 Marine Studies students when they presented some appetising seafood dishes. The Year 9 International Studies class will also have the pleasure of experiencing some culinary delights in Week 9.

However, Term 3 is shaping up to be just as exciting, with many more activities organised to enhance the learning of students in Social Science. One that I am personally looking forward to is our first Social Science international trip to Japan in September. YEAR 9 COMMERCE EXCURSION

TO COLES

On 24 May, Year 9 Commerce students were actively involved in a Comparison Shopping Task at Coles Warners Bay, made possible by the supportive management of Coles. Students enthusiastically compared Coles' brands with competing brands, based on a basket of goods that would be commonly purchased by households. Customers at Coles were impressed by the behaviour and positive attitude of our students and commented that it was a great activity for students to understand the cost of groceries as part of everyday living expenses. The students also described marketing activities used to attract customers in a number of businesses in the Warners Bay Plaza. An excel spread sheet was created by students to calculate the differences in prices and to understand the importance of good budgeting practices.

Mock Trial 2013

In Year 11 our Legal Studies students are given the opportunity to participate in the Mock Trial Competition run through the NSW Law Society. The competition involves teams from different schools competing against each other by arguing a legal case before a magistrate. Students take on the roles of barristers, solicitor, witnesses and court officer. The Mock Trial operates in a similar fashion to a real criminal or civil court case.

Mock Trial offers students a unique opportunity to combine a variety of skills: problem solving, higher order thinking, oratory, advocacy, teamwork and the ability to think on their feet.

Our team this year has proved to be up to the challenge and headed into Round 4 undefeated.

Unfortunately, we were lost by just 3 points to San Clemente High School this week in a closely fought battle. We are now waiting to see if we have made it through to the elimination rounds

Year 12 Port Stephens Excursion

On the 13 and 14 May, Year 12 Geography participated in their annual trip to Port Stephens. The Port Stephens area houses some of the most unique ecosystems in Australia; as a result it is a very popular tourist destination with many businesses taking advantage of this location to run eco-tourism activities. Stockton Bight Sand Dunes is the largest mobile sand dune system in the Southern Hemisphere and is at risk of irreversible damage due to both natural stresses from storm activities and increasing human pressures from development, sand mining and the use of Newcastle's commercial harbour.

Year 12 spent two days investigating both Stockton Bight Sand Dunes as an ecosystem at risk and the ecological sustainability of tourism operations in the Port Stephens area. In addition to their hard work Year 12 found some time to participate in some popular tourist activities. Students thoroughly enjoyed their time feeding the sharks and rays at Port Stephens Shark and Ray Centre, sand boarding down the dunes at Stockton Bight and Snorkelling at Fly Point. The excursion has reinforced their learning for the HSC and given them practical experience participating in fieldwork activities.

The majority of students really enjoyed jumping up and down with the swell, providing entertainment until we sighted the whales. Our first group of whales weren't



very co-operative, spending large amounts of time under the water. The second group, however, were much more cooperative slapping their tails and one jumping completely out of the water! The real skills were in being able to snap them with your camera. The excursion supported the current topics Marine Mammals (Year 9) and Marine Employment Industries (Year 10).

LUNCH

On Monday, the 17 June, 22 Society & Culture Students and 10 SRC students were lucky enough to see His Holiness the Dalai Lama speak at the Young Minds Conference at Sydney Town Hall.

Society & Culture students in the HSC complete a depth study on belief systems. As we focus on Buddhism, a visit to see Tibetan Buddhism's supreme leader, the Dalai Lama, was an opportunity too good to miss.



We dragged ourselves to the Cardiff Train Station at 4:30am (a big thank you to the parents), to commence our journey. We arrived at 7.30am at Sydney Town Hall to receive our wrist bands and identification passes and had our seats by 8.00am.

Welcome to Country was performed by a Cadigal Elder, one of the traditional owners of the inner Sydney city region. He told stories of his people and ended on a high telling the youth of today "Whenever there is a will, there are always relatives" which was met with laughter.

There was a mixing of cultures between students as we were encouraged to share stories with students in front of and behind our seating. These students were mainly from Private Boys or Private Girls boarding schools, which made the conversations very interesting.

Young Minds 2013 was an exciting forum exploring the issues facing our young people. Over 1700 people had gathered at the Sydney Town Hall to discuss issues that matter to youth today.

Some of the topics covered were:

- · How do we grow a good person
- · Learning and engagement
- Technology and the iGeneration
- Inspiration and success
- Positive human qualities
- Our world, our future
- · Young minds today

His Holiness the Dalai Lama described his childhood and his family, how at the age of eight (when he was proclaimed the 14th Dalai Lama) his priority was still playing with other children and did not take his teachings seriously until his teens. When discussing what makes a good person he said it is all about relationships and affection. We should only give affection to those who have the ability to show affection back (such as people and animals, not to objects like diamond rings, money, cars). His message was one of caring for each other and not for material wealth.


The most popular session was 'What would you like to ask His Holiness the Dalai Lama?' As one hundred students filed onto the stage there was an opportunity for these young people to ask His Holiness a question. Primary students from the age of six years and up had an equal opportunity to ask a question as the older students.













An eight year old asked "Can we ever have world peace?" His response was essentially 'Yes', as peace is not environmental but a human issue.

Senior students asked questions on how youth can gain the respect of elders and role models, and his view on gender in equality. A nineteen year old asked "If you could go back in time and speak to your nineteen year old self, what would you say?" He replied "That is quite a strange question, not much realistic, then perhaps, as your question is such, then my answer also, according that way, so I think I will tell it like an old person, 'Drink More'". This was met with laughter, but the Dalai Lama did not intend to give young people poor advice, he was just being as silly as he thought the question to be.

Students did not come away on a path of enlightenment, but did feel a sense of joy from watching such an inspirational speaker. Students had tears in their eyes at times and all students (those from Warners Bay High School and from the other schools seated around us) voiced their urge to cuddle His Holiness.

It was a rewarding and tiring day after more than twelve hours together, and most managed to slip in a quick nap on the train home.

CAREERS

Term Two has proven to be a very busy time for the Careers faculty. Students have had numerous opportunities to learn more about specific courses and careers through a number of workshops, expos and guest visits.

Earlier in the year, **Year 9 students** got an introduction to Careers during their Focus Day. We ran sessions in which students completed a Career Interest Test which revealed each student's individual traits and interests. The results of these tests showed the students their personal areas of strength, such as working with people, in scientific fields, using their practical skills, showing creative flair, an aptitude for work in business or a fondness for working outdoors. This test helps to get students thinking about a possible career path. Year 9 students were also introduced to ideas and skills involved in goal setting and planning.

Thirty Year 9 students recently participated in the **Try-A-Skill Careers Workshop**. This is a hands-on, practical day for students interested in trying the specific skills required for various apprenticeships and traineeships. Popular careers of interest to our students included carpentry, child care, electrotechnology and hairdressing.



Throughout the term, **Year 10 students** have been involved in Careers lessons. These sessions introduce students to school- to-work pathways, subject selection advice, useful websites, and job seeking hints. Students are shown how to access the school's Careers page, Moodle page and Warners Bay High Careers Faculty Facebook page and they are encouraged to check in regularly, as they are updated weekly with relevant career and job information.

On 24 May over 200 of our Year 10 students visited the **Careers Expo** at the Newcastle Jockey Club. Students explored exhibitions from the University of Newcastle, Hunter TAFE, private colleges, group training companies and an assortment of occupations. They spoke with representatives and collected information from these groups. Many of our students were interested in learning more about

engineering, hospitality, the police force and nursing. Most of our students found the day helpful and informative, and they left with a show bag full of appropriate information. Many also discovered the true meaning of the term 'show



bag' as they were asking where all the chips and chocolates were!

Year 10 Subject Selection Night and Mini Careers Expo attracted over 450 parents and students. It was wonderful to see so many supportive parents and enthusiastic students keen to learn more about what the Preliminary course has to offer. Ian West from the Board of Studies introduced the rules and guidelines for the Preliminary course and HSC. Each subject was well represented by school faculty members and many stands were bright, engaging, dynamic and highly appealing. A number of invited guests from the University of Newcastle, Hunter TAFE and various group training companies and apprenticeship centres were also present. Engineers Australia were impressed by the large number of enthusiastic and motivated future engineers at our school who showed a keen interest in learning more about engineering pathways.

A number of Year 10 students have already spent a week on Work Experience, learning work skills and interviewing staff from their chosen occupation this year. All Year 10 students have the opportunity to participate in Work Experience this year. Interested students should see the Careers Advisers for further information on how to complete some mandatory work health and safety tasks. Students must select a week in which they have no assessment tasks. Once an employer has been approached and the tasks have been completed, students should see a Careers Adviser for the appropriate forms.

Twenty students from Years 9 to 12 successfully gained their **White Card** this year, and a further 20 will be completing this Construction induction course shortly. This course is aimed at all students carrying out construction work, including: labourers,



apprentices and tradespersons. Students learn the basic principles of health and safety in the construction industry as well as information about preventing workplace injury and illness, workplace management injury workers' compensation. This course has been developed to meet the requirements of the National Code of Practice for Induction for Construction Work. Upon completion of this induction course. a student will receive a statement of attainment and the White Card License.

A **Year 11 Work Studies class** has been visited by a representative of the Australian Business Apprenticeships Centre this term. They have been learning more about the opportunities and pathways which are available to them and have been getting specialised help in developing skills which they can apply in a real work setting.




