

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

As we move into the middle of Term 2, many of our programs and initiatives are in full swing. I thought that I would briefly outline the components of our 2015 – 2017 School Plan and mention a few initiatives to hopefully get your support.

As you would recall from previous Bulletins, our School Plan was collaboratively developed by a volunteer team of teachers and the school executive. The planning was based on the data derived from students, staff and parents via the 2014 survey, and deep analysis of our diagnostic data from the HSC, NAPLAN and ESSA. The newly arrived School Excellence Framework data supplied to the school from the High Performance Unit of the Department was also examined. Together with the strategic directions of the Department of Education and Communities (DEC), we refined our directions for the next three years into three domains:

- Students – confident, resilient, engaged and creative life-long learners,
- Teaching – inspired and passionate teachers; and
- Community – a connected community valuing trust, respect and pride; a learning culture with high expectations valuing diversity with responsible and productive citizens.

An outline of the purpose of each of these strategic directions is included in the Bulletin. A more detailed outline of the processes used to achieve these directions is available on the school website.

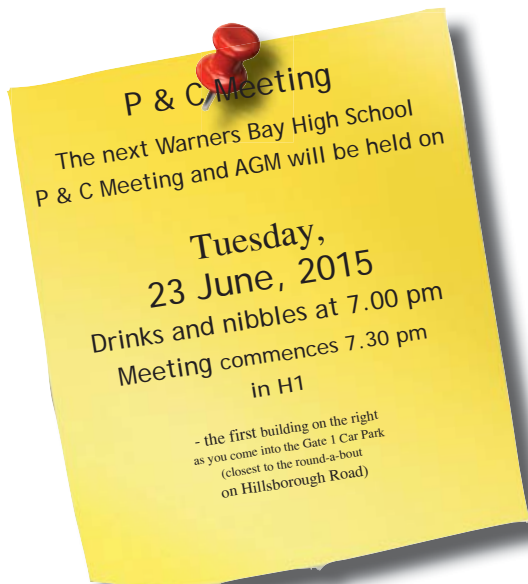
Thank you to the parents who provided ideas to inform the School Plan. Whilst the plan is published, it is never finished.

We will review the plan and its achievements as we move through the years. Feedback from parents is always valued and changes to the Processes and Products can occur based on parent feedback. An outline of the School Plan and the planning process was provided for P&C members during the May meeting (26.05.15).

Related to the School Plan is the marketing of our school to International students. Each year we have a small but valued contingent of International students coming from China, Brazil, Japan and sometimes European countries. International students contribute to the web of diversity in our school and provide a rich source of knowledge of different cultures as well as contributing to our understanding of cultural difference.

In July 2015, the Department of Education (DEC) will be re-structured. TAFE will no longer be a co-partner with the Department schools. This will mean change for the provision of Intensive Language classes prior to our International students starting at our school and to their Homestay arrangements. As a result of this I ask parents to consider the possibility of hosting an International student for perhaps three months to 18 months. More information will be provided at a later date. This request is just to sow the seed for families who might host an International student to give it some positive thought.

Moving now to the here and now. Thank you for your support and understanding as we moved through the severe storm and its ramifications at the start of this term. We are still cleaning up, but it is 'Business as Usual'. It will be many weeks before the DEC is able to clear the fallen trees, repair the fence and get us back to 'normal'. We fared well! There was no flooding or trees through our buildings. The money we have spent on drainage grates and regular tree assessments has paid off. We can now spend some funds on the aesthetics to look good for

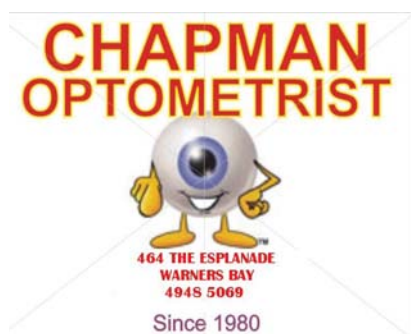
Congratulations to the following students for their achievements:

OPEN GIRLS FOOTBALL

On Thursday, 21 May, the Warners Bay Open Girls Football Team travelled to Speers Point to play Swansea High in a much anticipated Round 2 clash. The game had been rescheduled many times due to circumstances beyond the control of coaching and ground staff, and therefore the Lake Macquarie Football Centre's synthetic pitch was selected to avoid any further delay. The grounds were immaculate and allow the ball to run true, which was a positive for two teams brimming with fast and skilful players.

The game kicked off in brilliant sunshine in front of a small but enthusiastic crowd with Warners Bay starting the stronger. There was great fluency in the middle of the park with Kate Lindsay, Tayla Reynolds and Katelyn Lyddiard controlling the middle. Warners Bay were using their wide players well, and the distribution up and down the wing was excellent. Alexis Regan, Tiarna Knight, Siobhan O'Halloran and Lisa Crane were doing an excellent job of nullifying the Swansea attack and setting play in motion for Warners Bay. Georgia Cook was very busy up front playing a lone strikers role, and was looking for the ball at every opportunity.

The reason Swansea could not break through was due to the powerhouse defence combination of Sam Thorncraft and Chloe Hepplewhite. Swansea were trying to not let Warners Bay settle on the ball at all, and after the 10 minute mark, challenges started flying in to disrupt play from both sides. Due to the surface, the ball was running away with speed which at times helped play, but also caused a lot of stoppages.

As Bay pushed forward, more play down the wing caused confusion in the Swansea defence with several shots going just wide. Tiarna Knight had several shots which tested the keeper. Bay then started to push through the middle with some lovely passing movements. This resulted in a superb strike from 15 metres by Ebony Parkes which evaded a stretched Swansea keeper.

Bay then kept pushing forward, but the goal only brought Swansea to life. They started to use their wings more and played very well through the centre, this time managing to hold the ball better. They eventually levelled in the 27th minute with a strike that surprised keeper Margot Diederichs.

Swansea came out after the break determined to push on and find more goals but to Warners Bay's credit, they never stopped chasing and encouraging each other. Another shot from distance eluded Margot and went over her head, giving Swansea a 2-1 lead. This made the girls determined to pull a goal back.

The play in the middle of the park became congested and every ball was contested. Bay defended further up the pitch and pressured the Swansea back line with ferocity. This paid dividends when a deflected shot from about 15 metres by Tiarna Knight skittled past the keeper to draw level.

As Bay looked to force a winner, they pushed even further forward. Several substitutions in different positions meant tired legs but the girls managed to find an extra yard of pace when needed and really pushed Swansea towards the end of the second half.

With 12 minutes to play, Swansea found their winner. Some clever play in the middle of the park led to a beautiful through-ball for their striker to run onto. She held off two defenders and calmly curled the ball around our keeper in what was the goal of the day.

The girls didn't let their heads drop and continued to press but eventually went down 3-2 on the day.

It was a pleasure to coach the girls, and I thank the seniors who played as it was their last game for the school. The girls represented their school with pride and I was very proud of their determination and gamesmanship. Players of the match were a superb Lisa Crane and the tireless Katelyn Lyddiard.

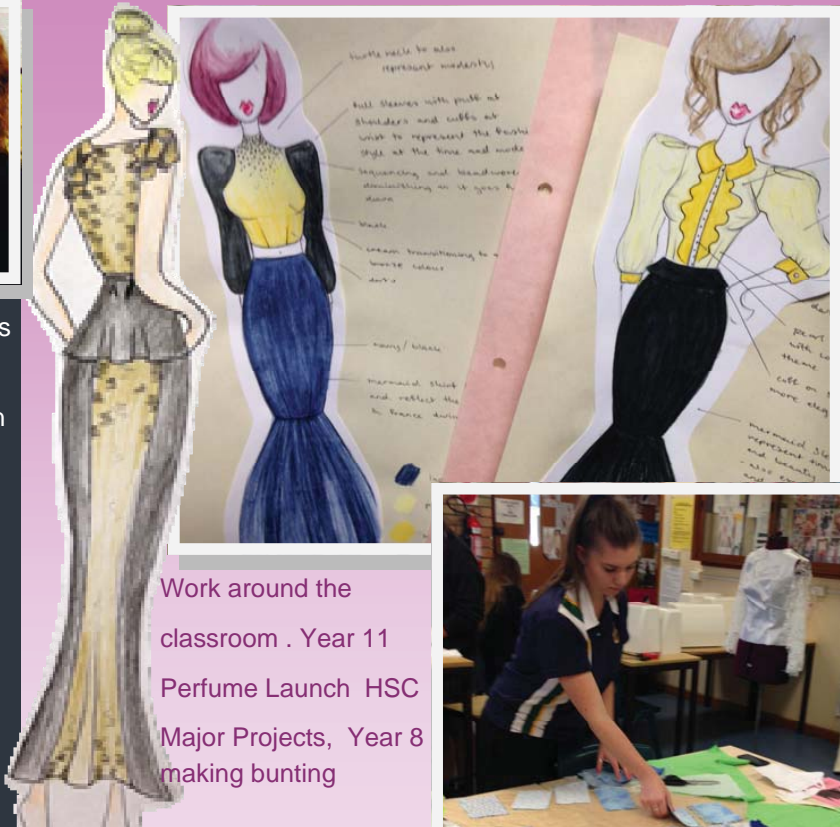

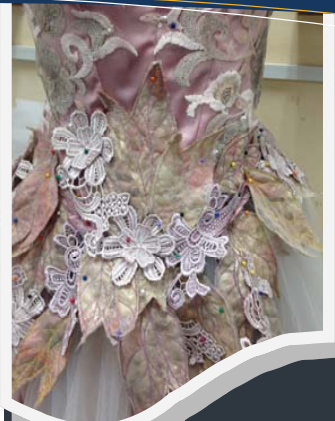


From the fashion files.....

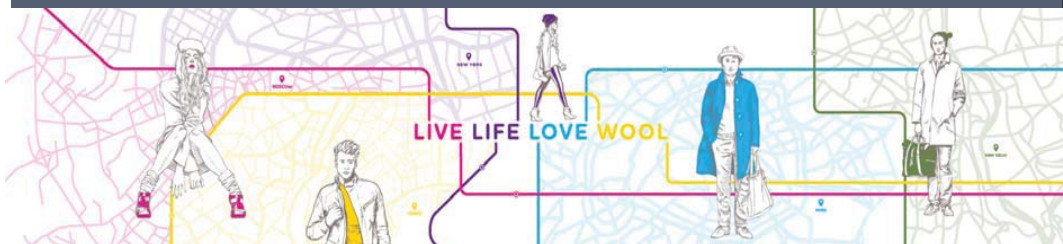
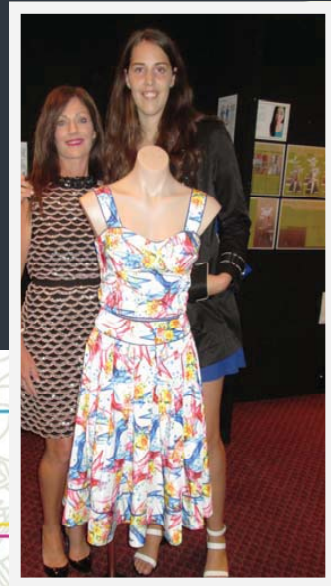

OPEN BOYS FOOTBALL

On 1 April, the Warners Bay HS Open Boys Football Team travelled to Merewether High School for a Round 2 clash. As both teams are full of players who regularly play in higher divisions on the weekend, it was anticipated that this was going to be a mouth-watering clash. The day itself had clear blue skies with a soft but fast playing surface; a necessary ingredient for free-flowing football.

Just after kick off however, it was Merewether who made the break-through. An agricultural challenge on their number 9 was made after just 90 seconds inside the 18 yard box, and the penalty was duly dispatched into the bottom corner beyond the reach of Jack Hamilton. The boys didn't let that deter them, and they pushed hard and fought for every ball. The boys were making the 50-50 challenges count. Special mention to Jack Lyddiard, Josh Chock, Matthew Parker, Jordan Sykes and Josh Anstess through this period, who worked tirelessly through the centre to reduce the deficit.

NATIONALLY CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA ON SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY

Notification for Parents and Carers

From 2015, all Government and non-Government schools across Australia are required to participate annually in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD).

The data provided to the Australian Government by the NSW Department of Education and Communities is provided in such a way that it cannot be used to identify any individual student or school.

Privacy Protection

The NSW Department of Education and Communities follows the requirements of the Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998 and the Health Records and Information Privacy Act 2002. Schools will collect, record, store and use data about individual students in line with these requirements. Data security and protection is a priority and students' personal details will be kept confidential.

Under Clause 52 of the Commonwealth Australian Education Regulation 2013, data collected by the NSW Department of Education and Communities for the NCCD must be provided to the Australian Government Department of Education and Training. This includes the number of students at each level of education, the number in each category of disability and the number at each level of adjustment. The information is provided to the Commonwealth as a series of number sets that cannot be used to identify any individual student or school.

The Australian Government Department of Education and Training follows the requirements of the Commonwealth Privacy Act 1988 when handling any data provided by NSW Department of Education and Communities in connection with the national data collection. A privacy notice has been developed to by the Australian Government to provide students, parents and carers with important privacy information in relation to the data collection. 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CAREERS

Term Two has proven to be a very busy time for the Careers faculty. Students have had numerous opportunities to learn more about specific courses and careers through a number of workshops, Expos and guest visits.

Throughout the term, Year 10 students have been involved in careers lessons. These sessions introduce students-to-school to work pathways, subject selection advice, useful websites, and job seeking hints. Students are shown how to access the school's Careers, Moodle and Warners Bay High Careers Faculty Facebook pages and they are encouraged to check in regularly as it is updated weekly with relevant career and job information. Information for subject selection is also located on the Warners Bay High School website.

On 21 May over 200 of our Year 10 students visited the Careers Expo at the Newcastle Jockey Club. Students explored exhibitions from the University of Newcastle, Hunter TAFE, private colleges, group training companies and an assortment of occupations. They spoke with representatives and collected information from these groups. Many of our students were interested in learning more about engineering, hospitality, the police force and nursing. Most of our students found the day helpful and informative, and they left with a show bag full of appropriate information. Our Year 10 students were fantastic school representatives, demonstrating their maturity throughout the Expo.

A number of Year 10 students have already spent a week on Work Experience, learning work skills and interviewing staff from their chosen occupation. All Yr 10 students have the opportunity to participate in Work Experience this year. Interested students should see the Careers Advisers for further information on how to complete some mandatory workplace health and safety tasks. Students must select a week in which they have no assessment tasks. Once an employer has been approached and the tasks have been completed, students should see a Careers Adviser for the appropriate forms.

Forty students from Years 9 to 12 successfully gained their White Card this year, and a further 20 will be completing this Construction Induction Course shortly. This course is aimed at all students carrying out construction work including: labourers, apprentices and tradespersons. Students learn the basic principles of health and safety in the construction industry as well as information about preventing workplace injury and illness, workplace injury management and Workers Compensation. This course has been developed to meet the requirements of the National Code of Practice for Induction for Construction Work. Upon completion of this induction course, a student will receive a statement of attainment and the White Card License.

The Careers faculty is currently running two community based programs. Food for Friendship is located in Warners Bay and takes on Year 9 students in a voluntary Work Experience situation. This happens once a week over an extended period and offers skill development in a variety of hospitality and retail areas. This is predominantly a charity based organisation that deals with regular clientele from Warners Bay and surrounding

suburbs. The most rewarding part of this program is witnessing the students become highly valued members of their local community. East Lakes Youth Centre is involved in a program for students from Years 9 to 12. They are working together to organise the opening of the Warners Bay Community Gardens at Cherry Road in the near future. Students are developing skills in event planning and communications. They are seeking donations from local businesses and planning a large scale BBQ celebration for all.

Career and Training Links are emailed once a week to Years 10, 11 and 12 students. This email lists full time job opportunities, apprenticeships and traineeships, and casual jobs in the local area. Students seeking employment should make a habit of checking this weekly!

NSW School Vaccination Program 2015

All Year 7 Students:

- **Varicella** vaccine (chicken pox) as a **single dose** – for any student who has not had the disease
- **Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis** (whooping cough) (dTpa) adult vaccine – as a **single dose** to all Year 7 students who have not received a previous dose.
- **Human Papillomavirus (HPV)** vaccine – in a **3 dose schedule with 2 month gap between doses 1 and 2 and a 4 month gap between doses 2 and 3.**

NEW VACCINE OFFERED IN 2015

ALL Year 11 & 12 Students

- **Measles Mumps Rubella** vaccine (MMR) – as a **single dose** to all Years 11 and 12 students **who have not received TWO previous doses.**

Experience with this program informs us that no more than 5-10% of students will require this vaccine. **The consent kit envelope makes it clear to parents that they should not complete the consent form if their child has received two previous doses of MMR and gives advice on how to find out how many doses their child has received.**

The HPV program for males in Year 9 has finished – any missed doses for Year 9 students from 2014 must be caught up by their doctor.

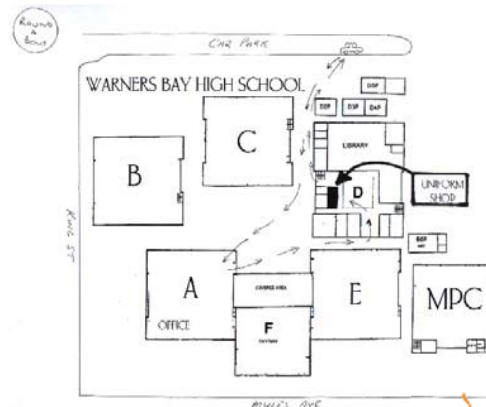
