- potential risks for children online, such as cyberbullying, identity theft, inappropriate contact and exposure to inappropriate content
- tips to help children stay safe online.

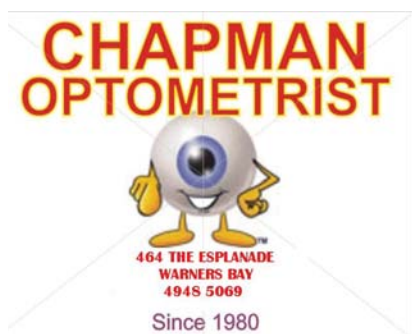
The presentation is conducted by an ACMA Cybersmart trainer and is free of charge.

Year 7 and Year 8 students will participate in a Cybersmart workshop during periods 7 and 8 on Tuesday, 1 September.

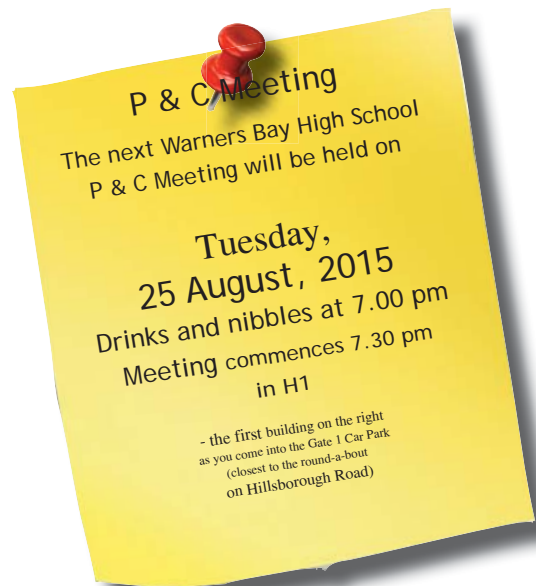

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MOCK TRIAL 2015

Students in Year 11 Legal Studies and Year 10 Commerce are given the opportunity to participate in the Mock Trial Competition run through the NSW Law Society. The competition involves teams from different schools competing against each other by arguing a legal case before a magistrate. Students take on the roles of barristers, solicitor, witnesses and court officers. The Mock Trial operates in a similar fashion to a real criminal or civil court case.

Mock Trial offers students a unique opportunity to combine a variety of skills: problem solving, higher order thinking, oratory, advocacy, team work and the ability to think on their feet.

Our team this year has proved to be up to the challenge. We have competed in four rounds so far and have won three of those; the fourth was lost by the smallest of margins. As a result we have progressed to the first elimination round which will be held during Week 5.



The first elimination round is against St Mary's Maitland. We have been allocated the role of defence in a criminal case where the prosecution will allege that we failed to disclose to the Police the identity of the person who was driving his car at the time a criminal offence occurred.

The team consists of **Georgina Le Sueur, Daniel Kocunik, Georgia O'Sullivan, Maddie Richards, Bayley Couzens, Shanon Gray and Emily McGuire. Ryan Dunn and Zac Reeves** were also part of the team during the earlier rounds.

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VIETNAM DAY 2015

Year 10 History students completed their Vietnam Day assessment task in Week 10, Term Two.

Vietnam Day is a full-day learning activity in which students engage in a variety of study sessions on aspects of the war, including the Battle of Long Tan, Australia's relationship with America over the course of the conflict, and the contribution of women to the armed services.



The highlights of the day were the opportunity to examine historical sources and talk to Vietnam Veterans on the Nam Bus, and a question and answer session hosted by the Newcastle and Hunter Region Vietnam Veterans. We are very appreciative of our special guests' support of our students' learning on Vietnam Day.

The students' final activity involved reflecting on their learning on Vietnam Day. Some of these reflections are published below.

The Australian soldiers who served in Vietnam suffered severe trauma during, and long after, the war. They experienced terrible living and fighting conditions where heavy rain would batter the ground every night.



Soldiers were always wet and covered in mud. There was always the risk of being shot by a hidden enemy that could be anywhere. There were many casualties that would affect their friends, families and other soldiers.

Upon their return home, after their defeat by the Viet Cong, they were not given a proper welcome due to the many people who opposed the war. They were not truly recognised for the courage they displayed in Vietnam, and were not assisted in

*their own battles with mental health problems such as PTSD. Without support, more Veterans will commit suicide, and that would be a stain on our country. **Bayley Couzens, 10G1.***

The Vietnam War was the longest conflict that Australia was committed to; we were involved in some capacity from 1962-1972. This war was an eye-opener for Australia. For the first time, television was showing the world what was actually happening. Thousands of Vietnamese died and hundreds of villages and homes were destroyed. Around 500 Australians died during our commitment to this war. The fact that Australians were sent to fight in the war was extremely controversial but our fear of the spread of communism was the main reason for our participation. The domino theory was scary, suggesting that surrounding countries were next in line after Vietnam.

*The biggest debate in Australia was why were we fighting someone else's war? Another controversial topic was conscription. In 1964, Australia needed to boost the number of troops we were supplying. A lottery system was used to pick the conscripts. There were many protesters against conscription. One protester, Bill White, refused to go, and was jailed for 21 days. Conscription and Australia's involvement were two of the most controversial topics of this time. **Sarah Fischer, 10B1.***



*The Vietnam War Veterans shared with us the post-war events of their lives and the conditions they have had to live with since their return from the war. The two men who talked to us both suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder, which includes depression and anxiety and they detailed how hard it has been to re-enter civilian life with the memories of the time they will never forget. The Veterans also talked to us about the physical conditions they had to endure in the war. The Veterans' talks gave us a great insight into the experiences of Australian soldiers in the Vietnam War. **Tara Wakefield, 10G2***

Students and teachers alike enjoyed and valued the performance.

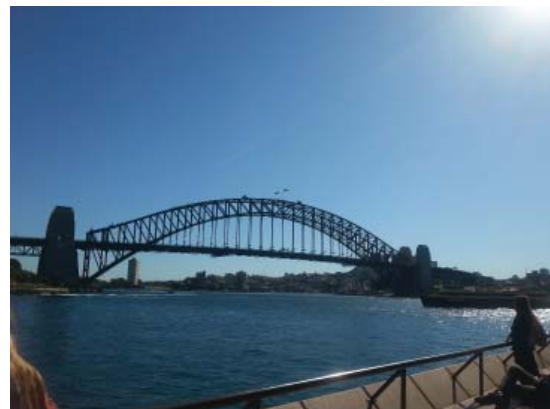

CAREERS

The Careers Faculty has been a hub of activity this term as we support Year 12 with their applications for university. We have also been busy helping Year 10 learn more about Vocational and Educational (TVET) learning. These courses are available to them in Years 11 and 12.

Many Year 12 students are currently applying for university. Once again the Careers Faculty hosted the highly successful "Going to Uni" night. The evening outlined application procedures, scholarships and various other schemes students need to be aware of when applying to university. We had approximately 160 students and parents attend. Year 12 students should collect their UAC book and Career Information sheet from the Careers office if they missed out on attending this event.

The Careers staff are available to discuss questions from all year 12 students and parents about applications to university and TAFE, and all career pathway options. Please feel free to make an appointment.

A large number of Year 10 students have participated in work experience during Terms Two and Three. These placements in occupations of interest give the students a multitude of insights and skills. For the majority of students their passions are confirmed; however, discovering an industry or profession is not for you is just as valuable. Information on work experience can also be found on the WBHS website under the heading of Careers. The next available work experience week is scheduled from Monday, 7 to Friday, 11 September in Week 9 of this term. Any Year 10 students who wishes to undertake work experience this term should see Careers staff in D block.

Year 10 students interested in TVET (Vocational Educational and Training) courses for 2016 have been keen to enrol in preparation for next year's studies. Unfortunately structural changes within TAFE have created delays in course codes and enrolment procedures. Students will be informed immediately once TAFE have opened applications for 2016.

Mrs Sommer and **Ms Lavis** have had the opportunity to attend a variety of seminars, University Open Days and careers workshops, accessing invaluable information for the school. All current careers information is updated weekly by our technology wiz, **Ms Dorsett**. The Warners Bay High School website has essential links and answers most of our commonly asked Careers questions.

NAN TIEN TEMPLE

EXCURSION

On Wednesday, 29 July 35 students from the Years 9 and 10 International Studies and Year 11 Society and Culture set off on an overnight cultural immersion visiting sites such as the Sri Venkateswara Temple, the Nan Tien Buddhist Temple and the Lakemba Mosque.



We started in Helensburg where students participated in a tour and morning tea. Helensburgh's Sri Venkateswara Temple is one of the most popular and impressive Hindu temples in the Southern Hemisphere, drawing visitors and Hindu devotees from all over New South Wales.

According to the ancient principles of Hindu temple construction, there are five requirements: The proposed site for a Hindu Temple should be a **virgin land...a forest...ideally on an island** with a plentiful **water source** located on a **coast line**. It is significant to note that the Sri Venkateswara Temple site has met all of the five requirements.

All students were required to look out the window when we crossed the 'Sea Cliff Bridge' at Clifton.



We arrived at the Nan Tien Buddhist Temple where students participated in monastic life. Students were required to maintain noble silence, rise at 5am and dine only on vegetarian meals in (attempted) silence. Our days were filled with numerous activities including tai chi, meditation, tea chan (ceremony) and a specific Dharma talk (Buddhist beliefs), chanting, calligraphy, a tour of the museum and the institute, the new moon ceremony involving incense and an energetic evening exploration of the grounds.



After leaving the temple we arrived at the Lakemba Mosque for a guided tour of the grounds and the inside workings of the mosque. We followed this up with a delicious meal at Jasmin Lebanese Restaurant before returning home.

HEALTH CARE PLANS

The Department of Education NSW provides schools with clear policies about managing the health care needs of all students enrolled in a public school. Parents and guardians have a responsibility to provide schools with detailed information about their child's health care needs and completed Departmental health plans or ASCIA plans for anaphylaxis/asthma.

INDIVIDUAL HEALTH CARE PLANS

1.14.1

An individual health care plan must be developed for any student:

- diagnosed with **moderate / severe asthma**, Type 1 diabetes, epilepsy or **anaphylaxis** and/or
- diagnosed as being at risk of an emergency and/or
- requiring the administration of health care procedures.

EXPECTATIONS OF PARENTS/GUARDIANS/CAREGIVERS

4.4.1

Parents are expected to:

- co-operate with the school on student health matters
- inform the school of the health needs of the child at enrolment or when health conditions develop or change
- liaise with the child's medical practitioner about the implications of any health condition for the school and convey advice and information from the medical practitioner to the school
- if required, provide prescribed medication and 'consumables' for administration by the school in a timely way and as agreed with the principal
- where relevant, collaborate with the school in planning to support the child's health needs at school including updating information and reviewing plans.

The policy also states that in a high school setting the goal is to have the young person develop independence in managing their health care condition unless it is considered by a GP as a severe case which may require intervention by school staff.

ANAPHYLAXIS POLICY

Anaphylaxis is a severe, rapidly progressive allergic reaction that is potentially life threatening. Certain foods and insect stings are the most common causes of anaphylaxis. Foods include peanuts, tree nuts (hazelnuts, cashews, and almonds), egg, strawberries, citrus, cow's milk, wheat, soy, fish and shellfish.

Other common allergens are insect stings, latex, medications and anaesthesia. Some signs and symptoms of anaphylaxis can include swelling of lips face or eyes, hives or welts, abdominal pain and or vomiting, difficulty breathing, swelling of the tongue, tightness or swelling in the throat, difficulty talking or breathing or loss of consciousness or collapse.

The key to prevention of anaphylaxis in schools is knowledge of those students who have been diagnosed as being at risk,

awareness of triggers (allergens), and prevention of exposure to these triggers. **Partnerships between schools and parents are important in ensuring that certain foods or items are kept away from the student while at school.**

All staff at Warners Bay High School are trained in the management of anaphylaxis and asthma.

WARNERS BAY HIGH SCHOOL WILL:

- provide, as far as practicable, a safe and supportive environment in which students at risk of anaphylaxis or asthma can participate equally in all aspects of schooling.
- engage with parents/guardians of students at risk of anaphylaxis and asthma in assessing risks, developing risk minimisation strategies and management strategies for the student.
- work with parents and students so students are aware of their asthma or anaphylaxis ASCIA plans and take responsibility in avoiding triggers by communicating with teachers and relevant staff members.

PARENTS OF STUDENTS WITH ASTHMA OR ANAPHYLAXIS WILL:

- provide the school with an **Epi-pen clearly stating the student's name on the package and have an Epi-pen located in the students bag.**
- provide Warners Bay High School with an up-to-date ASCIA action plan and carry Ventolin or their Epi-pen at all times.
- Parents of students with anaphylaxis must provide the school with an anaphylaxis or allergy ASCIA action plan completed in consultation with their GP.
- **ASCIA action plans must be reviewed and up-dated every 18 months at a minimum. Parents must take responsibility for providing Warners Bay High School with an ASCIA plan and medication that has not expired.**
- Parent's whose doctors do not believe an Epi-Pen is required will provide a Doctor's certificate for the school to take the student off the at-risk health care register.
- individual management plans for at-risk students must be developed prior to a child starting at Warners Bay High School.

We currently have a number of students with moderate to severe asthma and/or anaphylaxis whose ASCIA plans are not up-to-date or whose Epi-pens have expired. Please provide the school with an ASCIA plan as a matter of urgency.

Winter Fire Safety Checklist

FACT

Each year, the Fire and Rescue NSW attends approximately 4,500 residential fires in NSW with approximately 30% of them occurring in winter months, and 47% of fires starting in the kitchen

IS YOUR HOME WINTER FIRE SAFE?

We recommend this simple safety checklist to help keep homes fire safe this winter. Make sure you and everyone in your household follows the following safety advice:

- Never ever leave cooking unattended. **“Keep Looking When Cooking”**
- Most importantly, have an adequate number of suitable smoke alarms installed throughout your home and make sure that you test them regularly.
- Make sure you and all your family know two safe ways out of every room in your home.
- Have a written home escape plan in case of fire and practice it regularly.
- If you have a fireplace in your home make sure the chimney is clean, and its properly ventilated
- If you have a fireplace always place a screen in front of it when in use.
- Check electric blankets for damage or frayed cords before placing on the bed.
- Take care to keep curtains, tablecloths and bedding away from portable heaters.
- Keep wet clothing at least 1 metre from heaters or fireplaces and never leave unattended.
- If you use a clothes dryer make sure you clean the lint filter each and every time you use it.
- Only use one appliance per power point and switch off when not in use.
- Always extinguish candles or any other open flames before going to bed.
- Always handle candles or any other open flame with care.
- Store matches or lighters in a secure place not accessible to young children.
- Avoid the use of outdoor heating and cooking equipment inside your home. The use of this type of equipment indoors could lead to the build up of carbon Monoxide which could be fatal.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- Use only authorised installers of fixed heating appliances.
- If possible, in the kitchen keep a fire extinguisher and fire blanket placed near the exit.
- In Case of an Emergency Get out Stay Out and Call **Triple Zero (000)**.

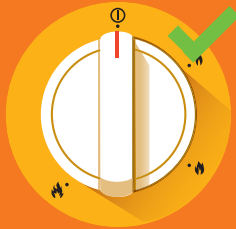

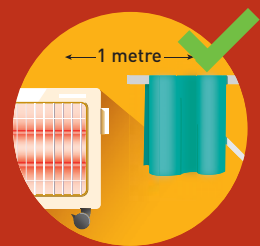

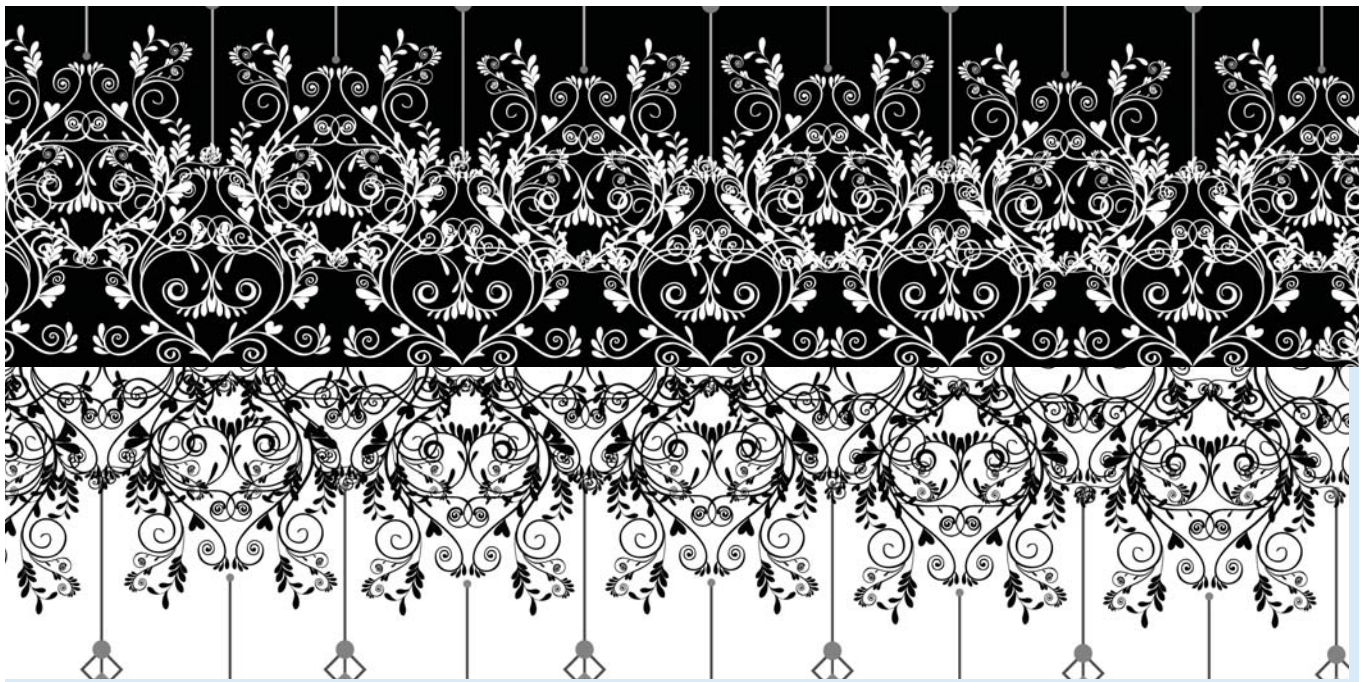

PREVENT FIRES FROM HEATERS

2. Install and use as per manufacturer's instructions.
3. If you suspect a fault, have the heater serviced or replaced.
4. Always supervise young children in rooms with open fires or working heaters.
5. Ensure flues and chimneys are regularly cleaned.
6. Strong fire screens should be set up in front of open fires.
7. Never use wheat bags in bed.

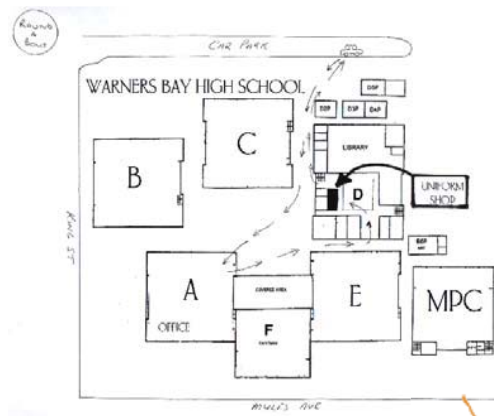
