Whilst they didn't progress to the Semi Finals they did well to be in the top 16 teams in NSW. Thank you **Mr Butler and Mr Farrar** for the encouragement and support.

I am always grateful for parents passing on news of student successes particularly in sports not part of the Combined High Schools (CHS) program. My congratulations go to **Jake Allison (Yr 9)** who competed in the Karate World Cup in Queensland where he was placed fourth in the world in his division. Wow! Well done Jake. Congratulations also to **Mikayla Enderby (Yr7)** who has been selected in the 2017 NSW All Schools Orienteering Team to compete in September in Bathurst. Good luck Mikayla. Thank you to the families who hosted the Suginami High School exchange students and the families still hosting the Hakodate and French students. We also have two International Exchange students, one from Denmark and one from Switzerland being hosted by our school community. Thank you to the Language staff **Mrs Sherwood, Mrs Holmes and Ms Tamas** for this wonderful opportunity to share our culture and learn about other cultures and thank you Mrs Dieleman for hosting one of the Suginami teachers. Our international visitors and excursions are a rich component at Warners Bay High school culture.

Apart from acknowledging and celebrating the great things we do, I also want to discuss one of the things we don't do so well, that being school uniform. We have an excellent uniform, well manufactured and moderately priced with additions made based on student feedback. However, a number of students are continuing to choose to wear non-approved garments including 'short shorts' (often an expensive brand and more expensive than the approved school shorts) and hooded jackets, often with logos and brands from well known companies.

Please be advised that as of Term 1, 2018 only the approved school uniform can be worn. This gives parents a significant time frame to prepare for this change. If any parent has difficulty purchasing the uniform the school can assist financially through the student assistance option. Please contact the school for this confidential service.

The girls' shorts and boys' jackets are the two pieces of apparel most often causing us concern. Last year I asked students

The new girls' shorts address the issues raised by the girls in relation to fit and fabric. The new jackets include a 'sloppy joe' style as well as a warm softshell type zip up jacket. As always, I will listen to students' feedback but the expectation is that all students will wear the approved uniform. Non-compliance results in students not participating in extracurricular events as per the school policy. Please refer to the school's uniform policy later in the Bulletin for further details.

Bridging Course

To support our Year 10 students as they move into Year 11 each year, commencing Week 5, Term 4 we implement a Bridging Course.

Students are placed into the subjects they have chosen for the Year 11 Preliminary program. Whilst they may not have the teacher who will be taking the class in 2018, they do get to 'taste test' the courses they have chosen. There is a process for students who, at the end of the Bridging Course want to change courses. This way, there is very little change of courses at the start of Year 11 and students can hit the ground running for the three terms of the Preliminary course.

The Bridging Course is a very important part of the Year 10 curriculum therefore students are expected to attend more than 85% of the time. Students who do not meet the attendance requirements and/or do not demonstrate commitment to their learning will forfeit their place in that course and will need to re-choose their pattern of study for 2018 from classes where there are available spaces.

My re-stating of our practices for the Bridging Course is related to the number of students who previously have applied to go on family holidays during the Bridging Course. Normal attendance requirements are expected up until Year 10 complete their studies for 2017. The last day for Year 10 in 2017 is Wednesday, 13 December after their presentation assembly 9.00am – 10.30am. Reports will be distributed after the presentation ceremony. Year 10 students who are accompanied by a parent/ carer may go home after the presentation ceremony.

Finishing on a positive note, my final thank you is to the many teachers who gave up part of their July vacation to come to school to run tutorials for our HSC students. Over the 10 days 313 students came more than once to participate in the tutorials. Thank you to **Ms Dal Zotto** for the organisation and opening the Library. HSC teachers ran tutorials in Textiles and Design (x2), IT Timber, Visual Arts (x2), Business Studies (x2), Design & Technology, Drama (x2), Economics, Biology, PDHPE, Mathematics (x2), Mathematics Extension 1, Modern History, CAFS, Engineering Studies, Maths Extension 2, French Continuers, Senior Science, Geography and Society and Culture.

Attendance


While we are all battling through the flu season it is a timely reminder to our school community that attendance matters. Attendance is a key determining factor for successful student outcomes. Below is a chart that shows just how non-attendance, as little as one day per week, can impact on student learning.

As a reminder, students are to be at school by 8:55am so they can make their way to roll call when the bell sounds.

In Term 2 we introduced a text message system to notify parents of 'partial absences'. This system is similar to the text message service we offer to parents and carers for whole day absences. Parents and carers can provide a valid explanation for their child's absence through a reply text or via our other communication platforms (Parent Portal, SkoolBag App or note to the Front Office). Please be advised by policy that absences need to be explained within 7 days of the absence.

Technology Report

BYOD is coming for Years 8-11. In Term 4 we move to full BYOD for all years after running three terms of mandatory BYOD for just Year 7. This means that there is an expectation that all students except the current Year 12, who will by this time be sitting their HSC exams, bring a device to school. By device we mean any wireless capable device with a keyboard but we recommend Chromebooks unless a student has an elective or senior course that demands a Windows or iOS platform.

Why Chromebook? – all our courses are run on Google Classroom and rely on web apps such as Google Docs or Microsoft 365 online Office software all of which can be run off a Chromebook. In the event that teachers



deliver subjects that demand higher specification computing rerquirements they will utilise one of the four computer labs. Other reasons....

- Cheap the WBHS BYOD purchase portal sells a Chromebook for \$290
- Battery Life Because Chromebooks are not running power hungry operating systems their batteries come with an excellent battery life. Most students are only charging their Chromebooks once or twice a week.
- Size Thin and Light
- **Speed** 7 second start up from shut down and 3 second start-up from sleep. This is a big issue with 40 minute periods as old windows machines can sometimes take up to 3-4 minutes to fully log on.
- Maintenance There are few moving parts as the Chromebook has a solid state hard drive and they can be reset with the push of a button.
- **Storage** students have an unlimited Google Drive account so they do not need to worry about flash drives or hard drive space as everything is stored in the cloud.

You can check out the <u>BYOD purchase portal</u> on the official school website. However, be aware that all purchases will not be delivered till first day back Term 4 so they can be delivered in bulk and set up for the school's network.

What if you don't want to purchase a Chromebook? – That's fine. You can purchase or bring any device you like as long as it has 5GHz wifi (which all modern computers do) and a keyboard. Students in Years 10 or 11 who are looking to buy a device that sees them through to University or TAFE may want to purchase a Windows or iOS device but at \$290 a Chromebook is a pretty smart 1-2 year option.



Other News...

All Years 7 to 9 students have been given a fully paid-up **Literacy Planet** account which remains with them until the end of 2018 or in the case of the current Year 9, 2017. Every student in Year 7 currently has homework activities which run off a word list custom built by English staff to match current course delivery. These homework activities will run all year and will soon be extended to Years 8 and 9. Your students should also be using their logins which have been emailed to them to participate in the National WordMania competition which is downloadable on their phones or iPads as an app.

WBHS Facebook is up and running with a focus on celebrating students' achievements, photos, videos and fun stuff. By keeping it irreverent and humorous and leaving the serious material for the Skoolbag App, we have managed to build its reach to over 4200 visitors in the last week alone after starting in late May this year. All photos and videos are privacy checked and come through Mr Dewell and myself for posting. Check in regularly or better still, follow us, to keep up with all the good news stories that come out of Warners Bay High plus a few totally unnecessary memes. The Skoolbag app remains as a medium for notifications and urgent alerts and has all the humour of a bag of brussel sprouts but it is good for you to digest on a regular basis.



Parent Portal - By this stage most parents/carers are on the portal but as always you need to keep your email up-to-date with the school if you wish to be connected to it. The Parent Portal allows you to simply explain absences, see timetables and daily bulletins, and book interviews when they arise. I am currently experimenting with our Moodle Site, which is accessible through the parent portal e-learning tab as a one stop shop for parents to gain information about assessments, policies and technology. I will be seeking feedback on this later in the year from users of the site.



NAPLAN Online School Readiness Testing will be running from 4 September to 8 September and involve all Year 7 and Year 9 students.

They will be required to sit two one-hour tests using our fleet of Chromebooks in normal classrooms. There is no need for student preparation as this is a test of the system, not the students. More information can be obtained from the official DoE flyer on our school website and Skoolbag App.

Story Submission: Newcastle Sunday Golden Days for Team Lake Mac

Twelve young athletes from Lake Macquarie returned home from Lithuania this week, weary but more worldly wise, following their participation in the 2017 International Children's Games.

Team Lake Mac, comprising swimmers and track and field athletes aged between 12 and 15, represented the City of Lake Macquarie at an annual competition that is billed as the biggest multi-sport youth event in the world.

The 2017 Games featured 1300 young athletes from 88 cities, with Team Lake Mac the only Australian representatives. Lake Macquarie has participated in the International Children's Games since 2008 and in 2014 became the first Australian city to host the event.

While there were plenty of personal best times recorded, the success story of the team was 800m runner Kaitlyn Klein, 15, of Eleebana, who won the gold medal in her event after leading the race from start to finish.

While her time of 2 mins 14.08 secs was shy of her personal best, the Warners Bay High student was delighted with her performance and buoyed by the experience of competing on an international stage.

"It's the fastest I've ever run without anyone in front of me to chase down, so I was pleased with the time," she said.

"The whole event was such a great experience, from learning how to look after myself and prepare for races without my mum around, to meeting lots of new people. We all had a great time."

Mayor of Lake Macquarie, Councillor Kay Fraser, accompanied the team to the host city Kaunas and was also effusive in her praise for the event. It was a hands-on experience for Cr Fraser, who at one stage found herself marshalling swimmers on the pool deck and keeping track of split times during races for the Team Lake Mac coach.

"Our kids were wonderful ambassadors for Lake Macquarie and had the time of their lives in the athletes' village, mixing with other young people from across the world," she said.

"They all said they would be going home and telling everyone what a great opportunity it is and encouraging others to participate in future games."

Head of Delegation Karen Turner, from the Hunter Academy of Sport, said the young athletes were well prepared and showed "outstanding passion and dedication to their sport".


"This resulted not only in many personal bests and top 10 placings but tremendous personal growth and skill development at an international level," she said.

Woolworths Earn & Learn 2017



DRAMA UPDATE

Drama Showcase

The 2nd Annual Drama Showcase was held in the MPC on Tuesday, 20 June. A very appreciative audience was entertained by a variety of performances from our elective Drama classes. Year 7 Drama Club gave a very insightful interpretation of what life is like for students starting High School and the audience could relate to the many issues this raised, not just from a student's perspective but also from the parents'. Year 8 delivered some amusing performances in the style of Commedia del Arte and displayed fine use of a sword!

Year 9 covered a range of real life events using the conventions of Verbatim Theatre. Some very powerful images and soundscapes provided a backdrop to the unfolding events and they created performances that were designed to make audiences think about what is happening in the world today.

Theatre in Education was the style utilised by the Year 10 class and they presented a range of issues that young people are facing today from peer pressure to bullying. Year 11 worked on devising a performance that explored the challenges faced by students moving through Year 11 into the HSC year and tried to highlight some of the support that is available. Two of the Year 12 students took the opportunity to perform and gain more feedback in their preparation for the HSC.

The week was a resounding success amongst the students as it was a good way to expand their drama skills and performance ability and have fun while doing it.

Although the week was short, the students learnt many new skills and knowledge useful in school Drama classes and any career in drama they wish to follow.

From The Drama Class Room

Year 12 Drama

Year 12 Drama has a very busy few weeks ahead of them as they prepare for the HSC Practical Exam and due date for Submitted Projects. On Wednesday, 16 August the students will be participating in their Group Showcase and Major Projects Day. They will be expected to be at school for the day working in their groups. A Senior Marker will be here to provide feedback and to help mark the Group Performances. That evening parents and friends are invited to come along to the Drama Room from 7.00pm to view the Group and Individual Performances. Students who have completed projects will also be sharing these with the audience on the night.

Monday, 21 August is the due date for the submitted projects and this year we have two students completing Video Drama and one student creating Costume Designs.

On Tuesday, 29 August HSC examiners will be in the school to mark the Group and Individual Performances. Students from Year 11 and Year 10 will have the opportunity to be part of the audience on this day. The students are working hard on producing some entertaining and creative performances and they will also have the opportunity to perform at the HSC MADD Night on Wednesday, 30 August.

Year 11 Drama

Year 11 Drama will be working on a Design and Production unit in Term 3. In groups they will be devising a design concept for their own interpretations of 'Hansel and Gretel'. They will create a set design, costume design, poster and budget, and also develop some of the script for their performance. In Week 7 students from Year 11 will have the opportunity to be part of the audience for the HSC Practical Exam and this will provide them with invaluable exposure to the standards expected in the HSC.

Year 10 Drama

In Term 3, Year 10 are studying acting and characterisation, learning useful techniques to help create authentic characters for the theatre. We are investigating the ideology of Rudolf Laban to explore the way we move our bodies and are experimenting with various aspects of the voice to further develop characterisation. We will then study the fundamental skills of Constantin Stanislavski, who trained actors to be creative in their work using emotion, imagination and intelligence to make realistic characters to which audiences can relate. This study will culminate in a scripted duologue, where students will be assessed on their ability to combine these techniques to create an original and genuine character.

Year 9 Drama


This term Year 9 are studying scripted drama and in particular investigating the style of realism. We are very fortunate to have a Preservice Teacher, Mr Peter Perry who will be working with the class as they move toward group assessment. Students are enjoying playing some new theatre games and learning different acting approaches through improvisations. We look forward to seeing what scripts are chosen and how they are interpreted for performance.



Our Year 7 Drama Group continues this semester, following an exciting end to Term 2, with the Drama Showcase. This was the first ever Drama performance for many of the students and we were extremely proud of their efforts. With the performance

behind us, we are now focusing on the skills of Improvisation. This is the ability to think spontaneously and make a reasonable offer or response in a given situation - something we are all confronted with at various times in our daily lives. Through Drama games and activities, Year 7 students are now learning how to develop these skills, along with their collaborative abilities and confidence, in our friendly and supportive environment.



Based at the Eleanora Conference Centre in Sydney and running over five days, students participated in workshops such as Commedia Dell'Arte, Event, Movement and voice, Video and Improvisation. Workshops were run by teachers from both the Hunter and regional areas before students worked with industry professionals such as Julia Homfray, who taught techniques from Suzuki and Japanese theatre, Danielle McKinnon, and who taught circus skills.

On the first night, campers were treated to a performance, "King Hit" by the Zeal theatre company, which was both shocking in its content and a superb example of characterisation and teamwork from the actors involved. On the second day students were lucky to be able to watch two of the best HSC individual performances from 2016 (see photo above). That day was full-on with four hour-and-a-half workshops running from dawn to dusk.

After a Q and A with several actors and crew from "Kinky Boots" (see photo right), students were prepared and inspired, ready to put on their own performances for the rest of the groups as well as a few lucky parents.

After a teary goodbye campers started leaving. The next and final morning a bus took the last of the campers to the train station; however, Drama students stick together and a month later contact is still being maintained.





Changes in the world of work requires workers to continually develop skills beyond those traditionally associated with their chosen occupations. Workers today need to become life-long learners and effective managers of their own careers to successfully negotiate the many changes they will encounter. Our focus in the Careers Faculty is to enable and teach students to locate and investigate potential pathways to better prepare them for the changing nature of life, learning and work.

The engagement of Year 12 students is at an all-time high. Students are applying for university courses, investigating tertiary study options and preparing their resumes for employment, traineeships and apprenticeships. We are currently seeing an influx of employers seeking Warners Bay High students for available positions in 2018 which we feel is an indicator that WBH students are held in high regard, as well as being well prepared for the work place.



Our Year 10 students are presently engaged in The Quality Learning Expo (QLE) which is taking place from the 13 to 17 November. QLE is an opportunity for Year 10 students to present a portfolio of the work they have completed throughout the year to a panel made up of community members, staff and Year 9 representatives. Community members are often impressed by the standard of work presented and they always enjoy looking at the work our students have produced.

A number of Year 10 students have already spent a week on Work Experience, learning work skills and interviewing staff from their chosen occupation this year. All Year 10 students have the opportunity to participate in work experience this year. Interested students should see the Careers Advisers for further information on how to complete some mandatory work health and safety tasks. Students must select a week in which they have no assessment tasks. Once an employer has been approached and the tasks have been completed, students should see a careers adviser for the appropriate forms.



Gain some work experience through voluntary work. Volunteering shows that you have initiative and are motivated to develop skills in your chosen career, so why not give it a go!

Career and Training Links are emailed to Years 10, 11 and 12 students each week. This email lists full time job opportunities, apprenticeships and traineeships and casual jobs in the local area. Students seeking employment should make a habit of checking this weekly, along with the Careers Noticeboard!

Japanese Sister School Visit 2017




Twenty-three students from our sister school in Tokyo left our school on Friday, 4 August after spending a memorable ten days homestaying with 24 students who study Japanese.

UNIFORM POLICY Commencing Term 4 2009 – Updated August, 2017

The school community through the WBHS P & C Association endorses the wearing of the designated school uniform. Conformity to the School Uniform Dress Code provides a safe environment for students as intruders can be easily recognised and the situation managed effectively.

Compliance with the school's Dress Code demonstrates a student's willingness to be part of the school community and their acceptance of the students' right to a safe learning environment. Wearing of the school uniform focuses students' minds on what lies ahead. In this case it helps focus the student on the school and the requirement that school work and learning is the priority for the next six hours, at least. All students are dressed the same. It says something about being in this together and it is an external sign of our belonging. The uniform is part of the education we provide. Students are to wear it and wear it well. This includes black shoes.

Black Shoes are part of the school uniform. For practical subjects the black shoes must have 'a substantial leather upper' to protect students against burns, cuts and spills. In TAS & Science in particular, students cannot participate in practical activities without correct footwear. This is a Health and Safety (H&S) regulation which will be enforced. For PD/H/PE and Sport students must wear black joggers or sports shoes.

Students who do not wear the designated and approved school uniform, in particular coloured jackets, hooded jackets and coloured jumpers, compromise the safety of all students. Hooded jackets are not permitted at any time.

Assistance:

Parents and carers who need financial assistance to purchase the designated school uniform are encouraged to apply for Student Assistance Funding. Application forms are available from the front office. This process is confidential and managed by the Principal. Parents/Carers can use this application form for other forms of financial assistance including subject contribution fees and mandatory excursion costs. The uniform is purchased through the school Uniform Shop. We strive to keep costs to a minimum.

Monitoring compliance with the School's Dress Code.

- 1. Uniforms are checked each morning by roll teachers assisted by designated Head Teachers for students in Years 7 10.
- 2. Designated Head Teachers check student uniform for each year group during the Monday morning assemblies.
- 3. Students who are recorded as out of uniform either in roll call or during the day will be noted electronically with students being given a blue slip indicating they have been identified and recorded for being out of uniform. Students who are out of uniform will be recorded only once per day.

Students who are out of uniform are recorded through the schools' administration management system. Lists of students who are identified as regularly out of uniform are given to the appropriate Head Teacher.

Letters are sent home to parents and carers of students who, after consultation with the relevant member of staff, consistently fail to follow the school's Dress Code.

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Out of Uniform Notes:

In extenuating circumstances when a student is unable to wear the correct school uniform, parents/carers are required to write a brief note outlining the circumstances for the student being out of uniform. Students must take this note before roll call to their relevant Year Adviser to receive an 'Out of Uniform Approval Card'.

If the Year Adviser is unavailable, students may take their note to the Head Teacher Student Welfare, Deputy Principals or Principal, to receive an 'Out of Uniform Approval Card'.

Students need to show their roll teacher this card during roll call; otherwise, they will be recorded as being out of uniform.

During the day students will be required to show this card to staff members on request.

Consequences for non-compliance with the Schools' Dress Code:

- 1. Students who are regularly out of uniform will have that information recorded on the front of their school reports as 'does not comply with the School Uniform Code on a regular basis'.
- 2. Students who do not comply with the School's Dress Code on a regular basis will not be permitted to:
 - (i) represent the school in school sporting teams for every code
 - (ii) participate in extra curricular cultural activities including Starstruck, school bands, overseas excursions, debating, public speaking, Mock Trial, school presentations for assemblies and MADD nights.
 - (iii) utilise the school's specialist teaching spaces including Music and Visual Arts rooms before and after school and during lunch/recess periods.
 - (iv) Participate in extra curricular activities including excursions.

Appeals – In exceptional circumstances students can appeal in terms of the consequences for noncompliance by putting their case for appeal in writing and handing it to the Principal for special consideration.

- 3. Students who continue to disregard the school's Dress Code and, after assistance being offered by the appropriate staff member together with the out of uniform notification being sent home, will be deemed to be demonstrating 'Persistent Disobedience.' In such cases a warning of suspension will be issued. Continued failure to comply with the school's Dress Code may lead to suspension.
- ★ Regular non-compliance is determined when, on three or more occasions in one term when uniform was monitored or checked by one or more of the monitoring processes, the student was recorded as being out of uniform. Students can redeem non-compliance when they have been in uniform for a period of ten weeks following registration of non-compliance.
